

Shaw Bears Roll Over Bulls; Eagles Dumped



WEST VA. STATE EDGES OUT VICTORY OVER FIGHTING NCC

DURHAM — A circus-type 87 yard pass from Alfred Graves to Oliver Ellis in the last minute of Saturday's game at O'Kelly Field here gave the West Virginia State College Yellowjackets a 7-2 victory over the North Carolina College Eagles. Graves kicked from place. Eagles tallied in the last four minutes for the extra point. The ups of the final frame when Bill Middleton blocked Graves' kick in the end zone for a safety.

In most departments the teams played on even terms, the Eagles getting 8 first downs in comparison to West Virginia's 9. Jerome Turner of Raleigh, N.C. end, excelled in punting with an average of 56 yards per try, his shortest boot sailing 40 yards. The Eagles tried 14 passes completing 5, while

the visitors completed 4 out of 9.

North Carolina College's most significant goalward drive came in the final quarter, beginning when Ellis of West Virginia kicked to his own 30 yard line. A pass from Thomas Allen to John Hunter brought the piskin to the 25, and on the next play Carl Galbreath picked up a first down as he pulled up at the 19. Allen accounted for another 8 yards. This drive ended 8 plays later when Jones failed to pick up the one yard needed for a touchdown and the ball went over on downs. The ball-carrying of Otto Fuller also featured in this drive.

It was on the play following this drive that Middleton gave the Eagles a taste of a possible victory by blocking the punt which Graves recovered for West Virginia behind the visitors' goal line with four minutes of playing time left. A few minutes later, however, the state end was tackled on the West Virginia's victory of the year when Butler Taylor of NCC faked to pass and was tackled on the West Virginia 45 on the fourth down. It was here that Graves stood in the last minutes of the game and hurled the touchdown pass into the waiting arms of Ellis who stepped across into pay-off territory.

St. Augustine's Horses Romp To Victory Over St. Paul's Tigers, 40-0

LAWRENCEVILLE, Va. — Playing in their annual All Saints Classic the Horses of St. Augustine's College, Raleigh, N. C. beat the St. Paul's Tigers 40-0. From that point it was Birch again carrying for the first touchdown. The Tigers came back and on a sustained drive marched to the Horses thirty where they lost the ball on a fumble. The Shaw Bears withstood a determined aerial barrage at the hands of the Johnson C. Smith Bulls Saturday afternoon before a sparse crowd at Chavis Park and pounded out a 27-0 victory over the visitors. The Smith aggregation, attempting 18 passes against the Bears who all season had shown pass defense frailties, found the locals had mended their ways.

The Bears, who had named Gary "John" Turner, day, served up the victory to their plucky T-operator, who was in a local hot spot after an appendectomy. The locals missed both Turner and Leroy Sellers, but pulled through splendidly with Jackson and Charles England at the T-post.

The victory evened up the Shaw record with four wins against as many losses, and established the Bears as unbeatable at home so far this season. The clear decision over Smith strengthened Shaw's bid for state supremacy and brightened the Bears' chances against the North Carolina Eagles Thanksgiving Day.

In this game for the first time Coach Brutus Wilson unleashed a bevy of classy freshmen performers who worked well with the Bears' stellar regulars. Heading the list was Robert Stephenson, halfback from Montclair, N. J. who covered two Smith fumbles, intercepted a pass, and accounted for a touchdown. George Benton, another freshman from New Jersey, added three extra points and produced

And in the final frame, Duke Reeves and Big Jim Cowke caught Paige behind the goal line for a safety.

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PREDICTS GREAT FUTURE FOR DOBY

Within two years Larry Eugene Doby, Negro outfielder for the Cleveland Indians, will be the best outfielder and hitter in the American League.

This prediction is made by Jim McCulley, leading New York sports writer in the current issue of Baseball Digest. McCulley forecasts the Indians' leading world series batter, 234 average, will be the American League's "Stan Musial."

Doby's record with the Indians this year bows out his backers. He batted .306 most of the season, hitting with 201 home runs in 65 runs, tracked out a home run in every park, but in Sportsman's in St. Louis, including his homer that won the fourth World Series game.

"Doby is the most improved ball player on our team for that matter in the whole league," Lou Houderman, Cleveland manager, has declared. "He has been an inspiration to all."

Thirty-five homers next season is predicted for the 23-year-old ball player, who McCulley, New York Daily News staff writer, says will surpass even Joe Louis in public esteem.
