**YOUR NATIONAL GUARD DIVISIONS
CONTINUE THE OLD TRADITIONS**

This is the eleventh of a series on the Infantry and Armored Divisions of the new National Guard. They are presented to acquaint you with the organization which will be an Army Force, trained, equipped and available for immediate service with the Regular Army in the event of any emergency.

41ST INFANTRY DIVISION — The 41st Infantry Division's shoulder patch depicting the sun setting over the Pacific also could well represent the setting sun of the Japanese Empire, for the National Guard units from America's West played a major role in its defeat in World War II.

Overseas in both World Wars, the 41st was first organized in 1917 with Guard troops from Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. The same state plus Idaho supplied its personnel for World War II, and it is active again today with National Guard troops from Oregon and Washington.

One of the division's present units—the 162nd Infantry Regiment from Oregon—traces its origin to 1887. Then known as 15th Second Oregon Volunteers, it fought in the Philippine Islands against the Spanish and Insurgents, served on the Mexican Border in 1916 and later in France. Other Regiments in the new division are the 186th Infantry of Oregon and the 181st Infantry of Washington.

It was in the last World War that the 41st saw its heaviest fighting. It sailed for Australia early in 1943 and on January 2, 1943, the 163rd Infantry pitched in at Sanamanda to help halt the Japs short of Port Moresby. When it came out 21 days later, the enemy had been stopped.

In late June of the same year the 162nd Infantry stormed ashore at Salamaua there to begin 75 days of continuous and unrelieved jungle fighting.
