Discrimination against Negroes in the United States is prohibited by the Civil Rights Act of 1948. A recent decision by the U. S. District Court in Newark, N. J., has ruled against the exclusion of Negroes from a swimming pool in Jersey City. The court's decision was based on the fact that the pool is a public place and the Civil Rights Act applies to it.

Catholic Priests Plan Interracial Monastery OWENSBORO, Ky. — Reminiscence of the role early Christian monks played in Christianizing and unifying the Western world, two Catholic Priests — one Negro, the other white — have arrived here to establish a monastery in western Kentucky for both Negroes and whites.

Fr. Shepherd, who is Colored, was ordained into the priesthood last June at Colledgeville, during the summer he served in a parish at St. Paul, Minn. Fr. Ketter, who is formerly professor of domestic theology at St. Benedict's College, St. Joseph, Minn.

After establishing the monastery, to which both Negro and white aspirants will be admitted, the priests plan to open a boarding school for boys. It is hoped that the monks' living together — Negroes and whites under the same roof — will encourage others to live together in Christian harmony.

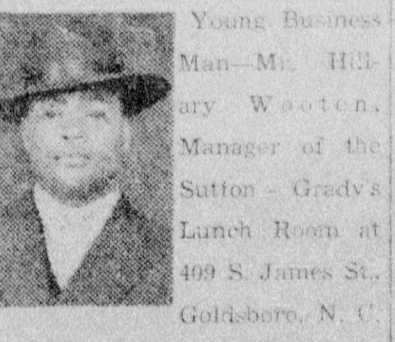
