

Howard U. Soccer Team Ends 2nd Consecutive Undefeated Season

Washington, D. C. — Howard University's Soccer Team concluded its second consecutive undefeated season last week by defeating the famous Falcon Athletic Club team of New York City, which was undefeated this season until the Bison encounter. The Howard-Falcon game, a hard fought contest staged in a sea of mud, resulted in a shut-out for the visitors, with the Bisons scoring four goals. Fedo Blake, scored two goals, with Ronald Gordon and Hilton Clark enabled the Bison's creek center forward, to score the other two goals.

The team was headed by Gordon, whose clever footwork kept the Falcons continually off-balance. Robert McFauline of the British-in-bassy, rates Gordon as one of the best players in the country. Other players who made an excellent account of themselves were Hilton Clark, Captain Bernard, fullback, and Hopeton Hibbard, halfback.

Commissions Open In U. S. Army Reserves

M. Sgt. M. G. Sparks, commanding officer of the Raleigh Army and Air Force Recruiting Station, announced last week that although many young veterans of World War II are taking advantage of the opportunity to obtain a direct commission as a second lieutenant in the Officers Reserve Corps with two years immediate active duty, there are still many more needed. In order to qualify for one of these direct commissions, a man must be at least 18 years of age but not have reached his 32nd birthday, have two years of college training, have previous service of at least one year in some branch of the Army Forces, and be pay-able fit.

It is not necessary to have attained any special grade during the former service and it is not necessary to have documentary proof of educational level at the time the application for a commission is submitted. Full information on this unprecedented offer of direct commissions to former servicemen may be obtained at the local Army and Air Force Recruiting Station, at 120 West Davis Street, Raleigh, or by asking any Army and Air Force Recruiting Sergeant.

LINCOLN CAGERS VICTORIOUS IN ONE, LOSE TWO

Lincoln University's basketball Lions made it one out of three in their recent swing through Pennsylvania and Ohio, winning from the Indiana (Pa.) State Teachers College team and dropping contests to Shippensburg (Pa.) State Teachers College and Oberlin College, in Ohio. The Lincoln team reports that all three of these "intercollegiate" games were high from the standpoint of making better inter-group relations among athletes.

Lincoln went down before Shippensburg by the close margin of 72 to 66. At halftime Lincoln was behind by 15 points and although the Lions outscored Shippensburg in the second half, they could not overcome the earlier deficit. George Moore led the Lion attack with 21 points, most of which he picked up in the second half. High scorer of the game was McClellan of Shippensburg with 27 points.

It was Lincoln's all the way in the Co. test with the Indiana State Teachers College. The Lions coasted in by a score of 92 to 47. This was the first time that the Indiana team had lost a home basketball game in four years. Moore again led the way for Lincoln with 39 points, seconded by last improving Bobby Smith who scored 17 points.

In the Oberlin game Lincoln went down by a score of 47 to 38 in a slow moving contest. At the end of the first half only two points separated the teams but Oberlin steadily pulled away in the second half. Pres. Robert P. Daniel, Oberlin's towering center, scored a high score of the evening with 17 points. Moore again was high man for Lincoln with 13 points, closely followed by (retired) Williams with 12 points.
