SENATE COMMITTEE OK'S CLOTURE BILL

WASHINGTON (ANP) - A cloture rule designed to cut off debate by a two-third vote of the senate was approved 10 to 3 by the Senate Rules committee last Wednesday. This antifilibuster measure, which is expected to be reported to the senate floor next week, will probably pave the way for the passage of civil rights legislation.

The majority-vote cloture rule was defeated in the committee by a vote of 11 to 2. The only two persons favoring it were Sens, Francis J. Myers (D. Pa.) and Irvin M. Ives (R., N. Y.)

The two-thirds vote cloture bill approved by the committee of the rules committee and Senator Kenneth S. Wherry (R., Neb.), was co-sponsored by Senator Carl Hayden (D., Ariz) chairman

The Southern bloc has threatened to filibuster auginst the cloture bill when it is brought to the floor for vote, while the proponents of the Morse-Myers bill have suggested that they would off a "majority amendmen." to the Hayden-Wherry bill
