Those ordained were the Rev. Mack O. Elgaro, S. V. D., of the La. Rev. Carlos Lewis, S. V. D., La Baco, Panama Canal Zone and the Rev. Curtis Washington, S. V. D., Coconut Grove, Fla. The Rev. Leo O. Arfield, vicar apostolic of Central New Guinea, served as ordaining prelate. The three young men became priests in the Society of the Divine Word.

This society now has 18 ordained priests. Of these 18, 10 are in Negro parishes, three in missions, work in Africa, Gold Coast, West Africa, and two at St. Augustine as teachers.

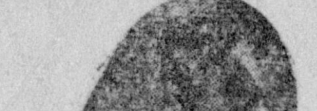

Hamilton, Va., (Special) — A shooting war toward Bill Young was waged in 25 points — 24 of them from the Pirates' side — in a hard-fought 61-58 victory over the NAACP team here, Friday night, February 18.

The loss put the Pirates' tournament bid in jeopardy and helped N. C. strengthen its stranglehold on a CIAA meet berth.

Young and his mates had to stave off two Pirate rallies led by Captain Carly Wilson and veteran guard Chuck Williams, to win. The Pirate captain and ex-captain scored 16 points each. After Coach J. M. McLeandro's men had worked carefully up to an 18-18 lead in the slow-moving first half Jimmy Garrett's hoopers pulled up to 22-19 at the half and took the lead, 23-22, as the second half started. The teams then battled on even terms until midway of the period, when a terrific Eagle drive netted 10 points to Hamilton's, 33-22 in a space of six minutes, and a 30-37 lead.

Even at that, Wilson and Williams led a final Pirate comeback that was not enough to make the game interesting again, but time out it short.

The Eagles dropped in 15 of 27 foul tries to 12 out of 24 for the Pirates. Harry Taylor's 24 points helped Young's efforts for the victors, while Ernest Warlick chimed in with 8. 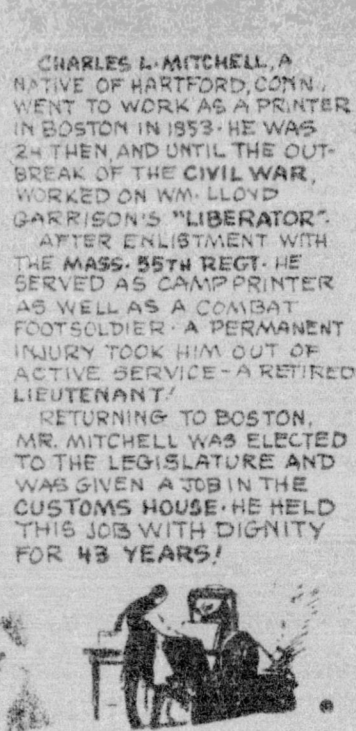
