Hot Springs, Ark. (ANP) — The National Baptist Convention, Inc., brought a three story brick building for the housing of a new 150 bed hospital, last week.

The Baptist voted to establish the hospital at a two-day meeting in Nashville. A bath house and nurse training school are to be operated in connection with the medical center, church officials said.

The building was originally erected with RFC funds by the late John Webb, local Negro leader. When Webb died the RFC took over the building. The church bought the edifice from the RFC.

MAHALIA JACKSON TO OFFER CONCERT

The Rev. Mabel "Sister" Gary will present Mahalia Jackson at the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium on Sunday afternoon, March 20 at 3 P. M.

Miss Jackson, an Apollo recording artist was born in New Orleans, La. and today is known to millions as the nation's "Queen of the Gospel Singers."

She is the official choist of four million Baptists. Last June in Atlanta, Georgia, she drew 21,000 persons to hear her sing and she is one of the highest paid spiritual singers in the country.

Mahalia Jackson commenced singing at an early age and joined the JOHNSON SINGERS in Chicago. True, she is one of the "pioneers" of gospel singing, since the Johnson Singers were probably the first true Gospel group. She and the members of this original group are the few "pioneers" of this music singing today.

Miss Jackson started touring and grew so in demand that she was quickly made the headline attraction in the religious programs here.

She received several lovely gifts.

TALGMADGE PLOTS GA. DICTATORSHIP

BY ALLERT ANDERSON ATLANTA (ANP) — Gov. Herman Talmadge and his supporters are busily engaged in creating a political dynasty in Georgia that is patterned along the lines of the Huey Long regime in Louisiana. During the past six weeks, the legislature has approved a number of measures which extend the governor's power over the state and makes it virtually impossible for opponents to stall off the impending threat of dictatorship.

Not only is the crusade directed against voters, by requiring them to register every four years and tightening qualifications requirements, but also against other phases of state government.

Among the things these bills will provide, if made into law, are: Put the state Democratic executive committee out of the jurisdiction of courts in deciding if Talmadge is eligible for reelection. Give the committee power over questions of eligibility and nomination for all state offices. Give the legislature sole power.

LINCOLN (Mo.) SEEKS NEW LAW BUILDING

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (ANP) — For the second straight year, Lincoln University is seeking money to construct a new building to house its law school. Dr. Sherman D. Scruggs, president of Lincoln, appeared before the house appropriations committee last week.

He asked for \$400,000 for a new law school in St. Louis where the present school occupies rented quarters. Last year his request for \$400,000 was approved by the state legislature, but vetoed by Gov. Phil M. Donnelly on the grounds that it should be built in Jefferson City on the main campus.

Dr. Scruggs said the legislature could decide where the school is to be built. Lincoln is also seeking \$400,000 for eight new buildings and \$2,915,570 for operation of the school during the 1949-51 biennium.
