You have been told time after time that the only way we will ever get anything here is to put a heavy voice and a bad vote to the advantage of the race. It may seem foolish but it is the only whisper we have and unless we are in a hurry and well we are destined.

From the last election we can assume many things after the election we are in a bind.

Not the candidates or the Board of Aldermen or Negroes.

What does that mean about us?

The registration is something that has been looked forward to by millions of years. In the primary it is alleged that 2,000 names of our people had been placed on the registration rolls despite a failure to the satisfaction of the registration. You can reach your own conclusion.

The people of the city have a two fold job in this election. First to get our people to take time out to register and second to get those same people back to the polling places to cast their votes.

Most of us can offer some of the most vicious excuse.

My one vote doesn't count any way.

They don't even count colored people v.t.

The white people are going to say things like they want to say way.

I want going to havethem people mad at me for laying so low.

That is exactly the way the politicians want you to talk, they want you to become discouraged so that you will stay home and let them do their thing. They want you to be happy with the little things that

We have tried to warn all ward leaders about accepting money from any candidate. This practice continues during the coming election. I shall secure their names and the amount of money they receive from each one and place his name in this column.
