The University and the Kentucky State College for Negroes by which he received off-campus instruction from university professors. The NAACP suit attacked the validity of this arrangement, contending that it did not offer training equal to that available to white students on the campus of the University. Agreeing that the only issue was that of equality of facilities, Judge Ford ordered the University to prove that Johnson was receiving equal training under the off-campus device. On motion of Thurgood Marshall, NAACP special counsel, Judge Ford handed down a judgment in favor of Johnson on the grounds that the University had failed to establish equality of facilities. Indeed, the NAACP attorneys contended, there were in reality no facilities for Negroes. Assisting Mr. Marshall in the case were NAACP lawyers Robert L. Carter, New York; Benjamin Shobe, Lexington; and James Nabrit, Washington. The method by which Kentucky sought to circumvent Supreme Court mandates requiring that Negroes be furnished equal educational facilities was the most sophisticated yet devised, Mr. Marshall contended. Judge Ford's decision may have widespread effect upon other states which have adopted similar devices to maintain segregation in education, the NAACP special counsel anticipated.

SHAW ACQUIRES

by January 1, 1950. Though the building, with exception of an independently-housed power plant, is a continuous structure, in effect it is three distinct units which may be utilized as three separate buildings by the University.

Dr. Robert P. Daniel, President of Shaw University, has indicated this the school plans to move its administrative offices into one of the units. At present the administrative offices of the school are scattered in buildings all over the campus.

A second division of the 112 room structure may be used as a residence hall for women teachers. Under present arrangements rooms for some of the women teachers are provided on one floor of Messerve Hall, while other teachers are accommodated in the two women's dormitories, Shaw and Estey Halls.

The administration was not certain to what use the third unit would be put. However, the building's suitability as a student center, to provide facilities for student organizations and activities was considered. Advantages of converting the unit into a residence hall for me teachers with perhaps additional men's dormitory space also were being weighed.

Included in the projected changes are plans for moving the University Nursery School from its present location in the basement of the library building to quarters in the newly acquired structure.

But these and other details will not be cleared up until after the meeting of the Shaw University Board of Trustees the first week in April. Dr. G. O. Bullock of Washington, D. C. is chairman of the Board; Dr. C. C. Spaulding, treasurer and Executive Committee Chairman.

President Daniel has indicated that approximately \$40,000.00 will be needed for renovation of the building and for its conversion to the use required by the institution. A campaign to raise these funds "will be projected among alumni and friends," he said.

The building, called by most the "Old Rex Hospital," was employed in that capacity until 1936, when a new Rex Hospital was built.

In that same year the county offices were moved into the present building. The hospital was named for John Rex, a native of Pennsylvania and one of the earliest settlers in Raleigh, who had bequeathed property for the establishment of a hospital for the sick and the afflicted of the City of Raleigh.

The Association planned to confer in the endorsement of M. Haywood by the East Raleigh group. E. L.
