## \$5,250 IN AWARDS PAID BY COMPANY

Ten employees of Commonwealth Edison Company Chicago received awards of more than \$100 each for improvement ideas suggested during 1948.

The largest award, \$1125, went to Lawrence Paitz for a suggestion which eliminated wiring inspection recalls. Paul G. Michaels received one high initial award of \$200 for an idea which simplified preparation of cost estimates on certain fabricated items.

The company paid a total of \$5,250 in awards for 260 suggestions adopted during the year.
