SUMMER READING CLUB PLANNED BY LOCAL LIBRARY

RALEIGH—The Richard B. Harrison Public Library is sponsoring a vacation reading club beginning July 11th and continuing through July 15th.

The theme for the six weeks will be "A CHOCOLATE TOUR." The children will enjoy traveling with books from town to town, visiting historical places and becoming acquainted with unusual sights. No fee will be charged for the books. Each child will be given a miniature clown. For every two books he reads, a bright colored dot will be added to the clown's costume. The contest is open to children in the fourth through eighth grades. The first group is composed of the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades, the second group is composed of the 7th and 8th grades. Reading certificates will be awarded to those reading 10 or more books. Persons reading ten more books in each group will be given a prize.

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FIVE NEGROES ON PERSONALS 16-MEMBER A. & T. TRUSTEE BOARD

Following a sweeping endorsement of his "forward program" by North Carolina citizens who voted \$225,000,000 in school and road bond issues Saturday, Governor W. Kerr Scott came through toward fulfillment of his pre-election promises on Monday.

The latest step of the Tax Relief Chief Executive was the naming of three additional Negroes to the board of Trustees of A. & T. College at Greensboro.

The three new Negro members, who bring the total race representation to five on the 16-member board, are L. W. James Anselk, director of the Hertford County Farm Bureau; E. R. Merrick, Durham banker and insurance company official; and J. W. Justice, of Mebane, an extension service farm agent.

The three succeed Emmett Bellamy of Wilmington, M. L. L. McLendon of Greensboro and Henry B. Caldwell, also of Greensboro. Each of the three new appointees will serve six-year terms which are scheduled to expire in 1955. Made at the same time was the announcement of appointment of two other trustees, Henry A. Scott of Haw River, a brother of the Governor, who was reappointed, and C. H. Dearborn of Statesville, who succeeds Z. Vance Ganting of Bethel.

The new appointments are in keeping with promises made by Governor Scott during his campaign to appoint Negro trustees to boards which have entrusted to the handling of Negroes.

The oldest father of the church will be presented a gift as well as the youngest father. The father in the audience having the largest family will receive a gift also.

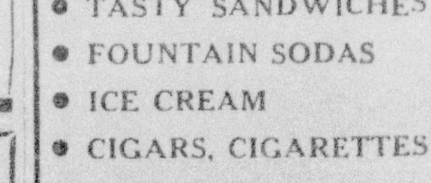
An interesting program has been arranged and the public is invited. The Rev. C. Andre Kearns is pastor of the church and Mrs. Ethel G. Young is president of the society.
