## DR. BETHUNE TO RETIRE AS HEAD OF NCNW

CHICAGO (ANP) — Two women, stars in their respective fields, commended the admiration of hundreds of citizens here last Sunday when the Chicago Metropolitan Council of the National Council of Negro Women and a group of individuals, headed by Miss Lena Home, gathered at the Central Y. W. C. A. to pay tribute to Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, founder and national president of the council.

Dr. Bethune, speaking to the council and the many friends of varied racial strains, voiced the hope that the National Council of Negro Women would grow into the National Council of United Women.

"There is a challenge to all women to join hands, hearts and minds," she said.

Miss Home spoke briefly, but with sincere and glowing tribute for Dr. Bethune. The beautiful songstress spoke of the long friendship of her family with Dr. Bethune and declared that she felt that every step of the way for her success was paved by Dr. Bethune and other courageous women like her.

Jordan while driving a jeep on a wet highway near Strasburg, France, was injured when his vehicle skidded into a by-passed mine which exploded. He was paralyzed from the waist down. This happened in September, 1945. When he returned to the United States, however, he and Miss Gardner remained good friends. He also decided to continue his education. Last week he earned his bachelor of arts degree in sociology from Virginia Union. He intends to study law.

The remaining chapters were dedicated to science, music literature and religion. The works of Dr. George Washington Carver, Dr. Ernest Just, Marian Anderson, Roland Hayes, H. T. Burleigh and David Livingstone were represented in these chapters. Narrator for the program was Al J. Jarman.
