Abbott Scholarship Deadline Is July 1

JEFFERSON CITY (ANP) — A four-hundred dollar scholarship in journalism at Lincoln University is open to individuals who have completed two years of college work. Deadline for submitting applications for the Robert S. Abbott Memorial scholarship is July 1.

The applications, which go to the dean of the school of journalism at Lincoln, must be accompanied by a transcript of the college record showing at least a B-average in all studies. The winner of the scholarship will serve a three-months internship at the Chicago Defender during the summer of 1950.

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KILLER EVADES POLICE AGAIN

KINSTON — A man, believed to be outlaw James Diggs, set off an intensive manhunt in the outskirts of this city just Wednesday.

Police reported that C. A. Barnett was threatened in the Neuse River lowlands with a pistol and that he man demanded transportation of the fisherman, Barnett escaped the threat by explaining that he did not have enough gasoline for the trip. He then called police and told them that the man resembled James Diggs, the outlaw.

Bloodhounds were immediately obtained from the Prison Department in Greenville and followed a trail over a six mile circle between the city and the Neuse River, which finally doubled back into the city to the railroad tracks. The bloodhounds lost the track in front of a theatre in the southern part of the city.

The fugitive at one point in his flight entered the river to throw off the bloodhounds, and when he doubled back to Kinston came within 200 yards of police officers and posse members stationed at a railroad trestle.

Police were busy screening reports coming in to them of the whereabouts of the fugitive in the city, after thoroughly checking the vicinity where the trial was lost on Wednesday. They believed that the fugitive was still in the city. He was first reported to be in the vicinity on Tuesday as a hitchhiker but was thought to have gone on through. It has been revealed that Diggs was once a resident of Kinston.

James Diggs, the outlaw, is wanted for the murder of his wife and two children at Norfolk, Va., and for the shooting of a policeman in Hamlet recently when he escaped authorities there.

H. U. PROF. IS NAMED TO CARIBBEAN RESEARCH POST

PORT OF SPAIN (ANP) — Dr. Erick Williams, professor of Social and Political science at Howard University in Washington, D. C., was confirmed last week in the post of deputy chairman of the Caribbean Research Council, one of the auxiliary bodies of the Caribbean commission, and in this capacity, will be in charge of the Research branch of the Central Secretariat of the commission.

A Trinidadian by birth, Dr. Williams has had a distinguished academic career and is the author of several books on Caribbean affairs. Winning the Trinidad island scholarship in 1931, he gained his B. A. at Oxford University in 1935, being placed first in the first class in the Honours School of Modern History. He was awarded his doctorate three years later.

NEGROES ON WRONG SIDE OF COUNTER

PORT OF SPAIN, TRINIDAD (ANP) — Negroes in the West Indies and the whole western hemisphere are too often on the wrong side of the counter, George S. Schuyler, prominent American newsman and magazine writer, said here while touring the Caribbeans recently.

He explained that Negroes did not have enough invested into business enterprise nor did they get enough of the better positions here although many are well qualified.

"My observation — not only in the West Indies but everywhere in the western world is that there are too many Negroes on the wrong side of the counter. Here most businesses are run by East Indians, white Portuguese and Assyrians. The Negroes are better educated but they are not in business on any large scale."
