1630 ENROLLED IN S. S. AT ATLANTA U.

ATLANTA — Enrollment at the Southern University and College of Business Administration School here reached a total of 1,630 students and thirty teachers, including Mrs. Whittaker announced that about 95 percent of them enrolled are Negroes. The school is the largest school of its kind in the South.

There are courses in the Schools of Art and Sciences, Business Administration, Library Science, Education, and Social Work.

NEW AMENDMENT TO HOUSING BILL TO BAN GHETTOS

WASHINGTON — An NAACP sponsored amendment to a new creation of new ghettos under the multi-million-dollar slum clearance and public housing program introduced by Congressman Adam Clayton Powell (D., N.Y.) was passed on June 28 by a vote of 190-111.

The amendment to the slum clearance bill of the bill requires local housing authorities to give preference in the selection of tenants for dwelling units built in the project area to families displaced therefrom because of clearance and redevelopment activities, who desire to live in such dwelling units, and who will be able to pay rental prices charged to other families for comparable dwelling units built as a part of the same redevelopment.

It cites throughout the country there has been mounting evidence that, under local slum clearance programs, whole Negro neighborhoods have been razed only to give new housing built thereon for whites only.

Amendments supported by the NAACP to prohibit segregation and discrimination in all housing, private and public, built under the act were defeated. The first such amendment introduced by Congressman James Fulton (R., Pa.), was rejected by a vote of 168-130. A similar amendment introduced by Congressman Vito Marcantonio (ALP, N.Y.), was defeated by a vote of 173-122.
