AJC DISTRIBUTES SELF SURVEY OF PREJUDICES

NEW YORK (AP) - A manual which enables communities to make a scientific "self survey" of group prejudices and tensions within their community societies is ready for distribution. It was announced here last week by the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues and the Commission on Community Interrelations of the American Jewish Congress.
The manual contains conclusions drawn scientifically by social psychologists in a test survey of an unaffiliated American community of 40,000 the results of which were announced last year as the "Northtown" survey.
As a result of the survey, 70 communities of varying size throughout the country requested distribution be made of the manual. At least 12 of them have begun the "scientific self-survey of prejudice and discrimination."

METHODISTS HOLD TRAINING SESSIONS

Morrisstown, Tenn. - "To imbue our young people with knowledge and enthusiasm for the Protestant way is our only hope of keeping America predominantly Protestant," Dr. Harry V. Richardson, president, Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Ga., said here in an address to members of the leadership training school of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church in session at Morrisstown, Conn.
Two areas needing urgent attention according to Dr. Richardson are the rural sections and college campuses. The thorough instruction of "country Christians" was meant so much to the continuity of the Christian church, and of the young men and women in universities who will be our leaders tomorrow is the task of enlightened Christian educators.
Preaching at the 11 a.m. worship service in the Morrisstown Bethel Methodist church, Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, of the Baltimore Area, Baltimore, Maryland, decried the lack of progress in the field of religion corresponding to our progress in this "marvelous age of material development." Speaking of our nation's fear of Communism, Bishop Shaw said that what we should fear is OUR practice of Christianity. Holding aloft the copy of the Holy Bible from which he had been reading, Bishop Shaw said "We have made a mess of this book for a long time."
