ALMOST every literate American believes that the Declaration of Independence was adopted by the Continental Congress in session at Philadelphia on July 4th, 1776. But it wasn't. Actually the Independence Resolution introduced by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia was debated on July 1st, and adopted by all provinces except New York on July 2nd.

The New York delegates delayed a week before voting as they lacked specific instructions from home. Thomas Jefferson's Declaration was adopted on July 4th, 1776 and has become—in the course of years—the Nation's number one holiday. However, the Declaration wasn't stored actually until August and knowledge of the resolution's adoption was general in Philadelphia by July 20th, when it was read for the first time publicly on the steps of Independence Hall.

ON the same date it was read to detachments of the American Army in and around the city of Brotherly Love. Simultaneously couriers were spurting north and south with the epochal news. Everywhere the patriots received it with delight, expressed in bonfires, the ringing of church bells and general merry making.
