## A MEETING

Last Saturday the First Congregational Church was the scene of a meeting. This meeting was originally scheduled to be held in the House chamber in the state Capitol. It wasn't held there because as the co-chairman of the committee told me, first arrangements were made by phone and when the committee requested written confirmation of the permission it was told that a mistake had been made.

The press conference with the principal speaker, O. John Roche, was scheduled to be held in the office of the county commissioners at the Wake County Court House. This meeting would have met the same fate as the Capitol meeting had it not been for a county official.

When the press assembled with the committee for the meeting, they were told that no one could authorize them to meet at the announced place because the press conference did not pertain to county business. However, after a little deliberation we were allowed about fifteen minutes to question Mr. Roche. Just before our time expired a gentleman even turned on the lights for us.

I relate these two incidents to you in case the organizing committee went to the Progressive Party for help. This has tended to prejudices a lot of people except Progressive Party members and clear thinking individuals against the committee's aims.

Many have said that the committee is one method the Progressives are using to build their party. I think this has some truth in it. Throughout the meeting I noticed that it was emphasized that the Progressives were the only ones who responded to the call of the lights for us.

In his press conference speech, Roche took

care to point out that the Progressive party must be built into the first party of the country. It's too bad if some groups have to take the issue of two youngsons' lives to expand political philosophy.

The entire advance building job of the meeting was a professional one. I know because I have seen the same methods used and I have read the same circulars in the northeastern section of the country. The only things changed here in Raleigh are personalities and events. In these instances I have observed, the purpose was solely to build the party. Roche was no sincerity for the cause or for which they were raising so much ruckus to use the government's word I hope southern sincerity is different.

I hope that the individuals participating in this committee, regardless of their political party affiliations, have just one common objective — to raise money for the appeal cause of the Daniels boys. *Progressive Party* for above petty political interests.

We must fight for our constitutional rights, but we cannot afford to become a sounding board for political parties. Despite the right of political parties to struggle to elevate themselves to positions of power, I feel that the trading upon the distress of individuals such as the Daniels boys, to the detriment of their right for life, makes that party as guilty of a lynching as would be a southern mob or a biased court. The group must realize that for every fight, there is a corresponding obligation.

Again I hope the hope that the campaign which has been started is one aimed at the saving of the lives of these boys if they are innocent and not at further muddying the waters of civil liberties here in North Carolina, the South or the United States, nor of losing the stock of a political party.


