ROSCOE BROWNE NAMED LINCOLN ASSISTANT DEAN

Lincoln University, Pa. — Roscoe Lee Browne, former CIAA and Middle Atlantic 880 Champion, will teach in the English Department and serve as Assistant to the Dean of Students at Lincoln University, Pennsylvania. It was announced today by Dr. Horace Mann Bond, President of Lincoln.

A graduate of Woodbury, New Jersey High School, where he was Valedictorian, and of Lincoln University, where he received his A. B. degree cum laude, Browne is now studying for the Ph. D. degree at Columbia University. He was salutatorian of the class of 1946 at Lincoln, and taught in the English Department there for a year following graduation. He served as an Instructor in English in the Army for three years.

He is a member of the New York Pioneer Track and Field Club, and is the present 880 record holder in both the CIAA and the Middle Atlantic Leagues. He is the Metropolitan Indoor 600 yard Champion, 880 record holder of the American-Canadian Track and Field Meet, record holder in 880 and 440 of American-British Guernsey and Trinidad Track and Field Meet, and a member of the Pioneer Club, Relay, which holds the Eastern record.

He is also a member of the Creative Theatre, Inc., and of the International House Players, of New York.

BUTCHER WILL STUDY DRAMA IN ENGLAND

WASHINGTON, D. C. — James W. Butcher, Jr., Asst. Professor of English and one of the three directors of the Howard Players at Howard University, has been awarded a grant under Public Law 584, 78th Congress, the Fulbright Act to assist him in his study of dramatic art at the Central School of Speech Training and Dramatic Art, London, England.

He was selected for the award by the Board of Foreign Scholarships upon recommendation of the State Department, the Institute of International Education and the United States Educational Commission in the United Kingdom.

Mr. Butcher has been associated just 31st with the Howard Players on a three-month tour of Norway, Denmark and Sweden to present three plays, "Mama's Daughters," "The Wild Duck," and "Miss Julia," expects to spend one year studying at the London school.

A native of Washington, D. C., he attended Howard University and was graduated with the A. B. degree from the University of Illinois in 1932. He received the M. A. degree in Drama from the University of Iowa in 1941, with the aid of a General Education Board Fellowship, and has done graduate work at Columbia University.

Mr. Butcher has been associated with the Howard Players since 1934. He spent 30 months as an Army officer during the war, serving as theater advisor with the Army Special Services Section. He is married to the former De-
