

# Arkansas To Hold Achievement Day

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (ANP) — October 10 will be Negro Achievement day at the 11th annual Arkansas Livestock show. It was announced here last week by State Senator Clyde E. Byrd, secretary-manager of the show.

On that date Negro farmers will show their cattle as an "opening wedge for the Negro people to start a livestock program." Promoters of the show, said they hoped to get the colored race away from cotton to the idea of diversifying their crops.

Chairman of the Negro Achievement Day program is Dr. J. M. Robinson of Little Rock. Members of the three sub-committees that will take over the program and plan it are:

Livestock committee — John Garmon, Jr., chairman, general manager of the Grant Cooperative Gin Association, Mariott, H. C. Ray and T. Roy Betton agricultural extension service, Little Rock; L. R. Gaines, assistant supervisor of vocational agriculture, Little Rock, and Ocie Lee Smith.

Program committee — Lawrence A. Davis, chairman, Dr. Robinson, Dr. E. T. Brown, North Little Rock; Frank Smith, school superintendent, Manifee; N. F. Jackson, principal, Washington high, El Dorado, and Dr. T. W. Coggs, president Arkansas Baptist College.

Promotion committee — Harry Bass chairman, executive secretary, Urban League of Greater Little Rock; Dean L. M. Christopher of Dunbar Junior College; W. H. Pierce, Union County agent, El Dorado, and C. A. Hicks, supervisor of Negro schools, state department of education.

## VIRGINIA NAACP TO RAISE FUNDS FOR DEFENSE OF 7

RICHMOND, Va. (ANP) — The week of September 10, will be "Martinville Seven" week in Virginia, the Virginia State Conference of NAACP branches declared last week. During this time the NAACP will conduct a concentrated drive to raise \$5,000 to aid in the defense of seven now sentenced to die.

W. Lester Banks, executive secretary of the state NAACP, says the money is needed to help cover past expenses plus future costs of appeals for the seven men. He said the NAACP does not believe that these men received a fair trial, and it is interested in seeing that they have a retrial.

The question of whether the men are guilty or innocent is not the important one, he said, the big light is to see that they get an honest trial in court.

The Martinville Seven Defense fund committee will handle the money raised during the campaign. All contributions should be sent to W. ## CHILD'S RELATIVE ACCUSES COURT OF NEGLIGENCE

CHICAGO (ANP) — Officials of the Juvenile court were severely criticized here last week for their handling of the case of Janette Coleman, a child found half-starved and locked in a basement room last July 3.

Accusing the court authorities of not providing for the proper care of Janette was distant relative, Mrs. Lottie Hightower, 46. She criticized the court for wanting to place her in a foster home because she said, Jannette would not receive the care and attention that would be provided for her in an institution.

Mrs. Hightower also denounced officials for sending the girl home when her case was first discovered rather than taking her to the Juvenile home run by the court.

According to Mrs. M. Janson, supervisor at the court, no definite plans have been made for the girl. She has to await her turn, Mrs. Jan said, before any definite plans can be made. She also pointed out that the court psychiatrist was overloaded with work.

Declaring that she would care for Janette, herself, Mrs. Hightower said she would get no public assistance because she is a distant relative.

## NEGRO TO RUN FOR PHILLY MAGISTRATE

PHILADELPHIA (ANP) — The Progressive party was placed on the Philadelphia ballot Wednesday when 11,500 signatures were filed at City Hall and other details required by the city were answered. Also nominating papers were filed which contained the names of five persons on the ballot.

The only Negro on the ballot which supported Magistrate Joseph H. Rainey for Congress last year was Booker T. Rowe, a Kentucky State College graduate, who has been a resident of Philadelphia for six years.

Rowe is slated for the office of magistrate in the 28th ward in which he lives. He campaigned last year for the Pennsylvania State assembly and polled 18,000 votes. A radio engineer, Rowe is a native of Danville, Ky. He is a member of Jones Tabernacle and a member of Omega Psi Phi fraternity. This makes his second year in politics.
