Peacock's statement came at the winding up of the summer operation of the parks which were run on an experimental interracial basis by the Friends. In reporting on this project the director stated positively that "every recreation activity from Mardi Gras parades to soft ball games has been interracial.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (ANP) - Six of the estimated 75 Negroes who attended the summer sessions at the University of Oklahoma plan to enroll in the school in the fall semester. These students are:

James Ewery, seeking his master's in music education; G. W. McLaurin, for a doctorate in education; Malcolm S. Whitby, master's in audio-visual education; Mrs. Orpherita Daniels' master's in social work, and Mrs. Ada. Lois Fisher and T. M. Roberts, law.

They will attend classes with the white students but will be segregated from them in the classroom just as were the 75 summer school students.

Negroes were allowed to attend the University of Oklahoma and other state schools that were all-white for the first time this summer when the state legislature passed a law opening courses not offered at Langston university, the all-Negro state school, to colored
