

### MEXICANS WELCOME DEPARTURE OF AMERICANS

SAN MIGUEL ALLENDE, Mex. (ANP)—The departure of American students from the San Miguel Art School last week left native Mexican citizens with no regrets.

Natives, who had become disgusted with the whites' disorderly conduct which included drunkenness, brawls, and a murder in the end. Because of their dislike of the Americans, Mexicans had dubbed them "Gringos."

Troubles at the art school began after the school had received publicity in a national picture magazine. Before then, natives say, the 100 American students, mostly veterans, made up a serious minded group. After that the American enrollment increased to 200 ex-G. I.'s who with their wives and sweethearts "had a ball" natives report.

To get rid of the U. S. students, the Veterans administration withdrew its support. One veteran is still there on charges of killing another ex-G.I. over a girl.

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### LIVINGSTONE BEGINS 68TH YEAR TUESDAY

The sixty-eighth annual session of Livingstone College opens on Tuesday, September 20, with Freshman Week. From all indications, the school will have a banner year. Seven new members have been added to the faculty coming from leading graduate schools of the country.

Rev. Harlee H. Little, after a year's study at Div. Theological Seminary, returns to his Alma Mater as Professor of Rural Church Work in Hood Seminary. Rev. Little received both the A. B. and B. D. degrees from Livingstone College.

Mrs. Eliza Harris who holds the M. A. degree from the University of Michigan, joins the Department of Education as instructor of Elementary Education.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Mitchell will head the Physical Education Department. Mr. Mitchell holds the B. A. degree from Texas College and has done additional work at Springfield College in Massachusetts. Mrs. Mitchell holds the B. S. degree from Tuskegee Institute with additional work at Western Reserve University.

Formal opening of the college will be held on Tuesday, September 27 at 2:30 P. M. in the College auditorium. With President Trent presiding, a welcome address will be delivered by Mayor Clifford A. Peeler.

The public is cordially invited. Dr. A. L. Cromwell, President of the National Alumni Association, will also extend words of welcome.

RALEIGH — More than 200 Negro farmers, men, women and veterans witnessed a series of tobacco grading demonstrations Wednesday and Thursday of last week, according to W. C. Davenport, Negro County Agent, and E. E. Evans, assistant Negro County Agent, both of the State College Extension Service.

Jones E. Jeffries, marketing and grading specialist of the Tobacco Branch of the USDA, gave the demonstrations which were conducted on the farms of Romas Dunn, Route 2, Wake Forest; Cleveland Rogers, Route 2, Wendell; C. H. McCullers, Route 1, Apex; and Odie Spence, Route 1, Holly Springs.

The demonstration on the Spence farm was sponsored by LeRoy Burton, vocational teacher, L. T. Brown, Kermit Cockrell, Prof. Gigsly, and Walter Evans, veteran agricultural teacher all of the Fuquay Springs High School.

After the demonstration on the McCullers farm the delegation was feted with chicken salad sandwiches and ice cold punch which was sponsored by the communities of New Hill and Friendship.

### HOWARD GETS GRANTS FOR RESEARCH WORK

WASHINGTON, D. C.— At its September meeting, held in Founders Library at Howard University on Saturday, September 17th, the Board of Trustees of Howard University accepted grants totaling \$114,993 for research projects. It was revealed today by Dr. Jas. M. Nabrit, Jr., Secretary of Howard University.

The research grants are as follows:

\$9,612 from the Mental Hygiene Division of the United States Public Health Service, in support of training in psychiatric social work; \$2,640 from the Bureau of Food and Drugs Administration toward a research project in the field of penicillin, streptomycin and other anti-biotics; \$13,232 from the National Institute of Health, U. S. Public Health Service, in support of research projects in the Division of Tuberculosis, Department of Medicine; \$7,668 from the National Institute of Health, U. S. Public Health Service, in support of a research project in the Department of Pharmacology; two grants totaling \$43,447 from the National Institute of Health, U. S. Public Health Service for graduate and undergraduate training programs in psychiatry; \$400 from Endo Products, Inc., of New York City for a study on the anaesthetic properties of one firm's products; \$32,000 from the National Health Institute, U. S. Public Health Service for two research projects and a cardiovascular teaching project; and \$5,994 from the National Institute of Dental Research, U. S. Public Health Service for a project on periodontal disease.

Dr. Nabrit also announced the appointment of W. Spurgeon Burke who has been manager of Carver and Slowe Halls since 1942 as manager of Service Enterprises at Howard University; the appointment of Dr. Amiya Chakravarty, Professor of English at Calcutta University on leave-of-absence as Visiting Professor of Religion.

Mr. Burke, a graduate of the Academy, College and Law School of Howard University, will be responsible for the management of University service Enterprises activities and those involved in the operation of Carver and Slowe Halls. Dr. Chakravarty is a graduate of Oxford University with the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. From 1927 to 1933 he served as library secretary to Dr. Rabindranath Tagore and for a number of years was friend and counselor to the late Mahatma Gandhi.

Dr. Hill is a graduate of Lincoln University, School of Theology, the University of Oregon and the Pacific School of Religion.

### 572 FRESHMEN ENROLL AT A & M

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Five hundred and seventy-two freshmen entered the Florida A. and M. College on Monday, September 12, to begin the week of "Freshman Orientation" with twenty-one upperclassmen back to assist them in getting acquainted with the facilities and offerings of the college.

On Monday the students received all general information, toured the campus, took personality inventories, met the entire college faculty and staff and received greetings from Acting President H. Manning Elfrson.
