## JAILED IN GUN THREAT TO TOT

**CHECAGO (ANP)** — Mrs. Ore Williams didn't like the idea of a white ex-G.I. with a gun, but when her son Robert, 23, was last week shot and killed by a Communist and they discovered that the man had a small pistol in his room.

How it happened, Mrs. Williams, who lives in the 1st basement apartment on the west side, told police that Dillan Wohlkuen, 45, went to the bathroom and found a .38-caliber pistol in her son Wohlkuen's room. She said she saw the gun in the apartment.

Returning a little later, he drew a gas and ordered the boy out. The boy had even denied this and said Robert and other children were running up and down the hallway and he had gotten up to quiet them.

When police arrived, the first thing they saw on the ex-G.I. bed were six pistols, all loaded. When Wohlkuen saw them, he is said to have started to draw one of two pistols from his pocket, but was immediately overcome.

A search of the apartment uncovered 36 loaded pistols, a rifle, a hand grenade and more than 2,000 rounds of ammunition. In addition, police found obscene literature and a cat-o-nine tails.

Wohlkuen told police that he was a gun collector. He had purchased the pistols, all of foreign make, from returning overseas soldiers and had bought ammunition since his discharge in 1943. He is a painter for a novel company.

## KY. EDUCATOR DIES

**LOUISVILLE (ANP)** — Harvey Clarence Russell, Kentucky educator, died in his home in Louisville last week as a result of a heart attack.

Russell was conversing with his brother at the time of his death. His wife, Mrs. Julia Jones Russell, was in Danville, Ky., where her mother had died the week before. Educated at Kentucky State College, Simmons University of Cincinnati, Mr. Russell has been active in Phi Kappa Phi fraternities in the field of education for many years. At the time of his death, he was business manager for Simmons University.

## PICKET LINE GETS JOBS FOR FOURTEEN

**SAN FRANCISCO (ANP)** — The not-so-widow followed a slogan, "Don't buy where you can't work," achieved excellent results for the unemployment committee of the Affiliated Clubs and organizations in their 23 days' picketing of stores along the Fillmore Street business district here recently. At last count, 14 Negroes had been hired in stores patronized, mainly by colored people.

First of eight stores to give in to demands that Negroes be hired in the stores which draw most of their patronage from Negro trade was Wisconsin grocery store, one of a Wisconsin chain. The store hired an apprentice grocery clerk.

Other stores falling in line were the Frank Oberato Market, an Italian luncheon, Benny's market, one part-time butcher, American market, two men full-time, Western, Cascade liquor stores, one full-time clerk, each, 20th Century market, three men, part-time; Louis and Victory markets, one full-time and one full-time employee, respectively; Littleman's grocery, one full-time worker and trader's grocery, one man, full-time.

## "RA" For Democracy

**MILWAUKEE, Wis. (ANP)** — Dr. Austin L. Porterfield, Sociology professor at Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth, Tex., told the National Probation and Parole association that America must end its philosophy of violence last week.

Dr. Porterfield pointed out many conditions which would have to be altered before the country has a more harmonious way of life. Among these were — the eradication of such groups as the KKK, the ending of racial conflicts thru better understanding, making jails and prisons welfare and social institutions instead of "engines of reform," and a court system which would be the spirit of the constitution.

The end which the social scientist seeks calls for a "stabilized" family and a "nurtured" church.
