ASK N. Y. EDUCATION DEPT. TO HALT BIAS

NEW YORK — The New York State Department of Education has been asked by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to end segregation of Negro children in the public schools of Hempstead, Long Island.

Following filing of the appeal last week, Negro parents sent their children back to school pending the outcome of their petition to the state agency. Failure of the Hempstead board of education to integrate Negro pupils precipitated a strike at the opening of the school term.

TO STUDY IN LONDON — Miss Mary Lee Brown, director of public health nursing and associate professor of nursing education at Meharry Medical College, was awarded a Commonwealth fund's fellowship recently for study in Europe. Miss Brown will sail on the Queen Elizabeth Sept. 21 for a year's study on the social aspects of the medical care program in Great Britain under the director of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. She was appointed recently a member of the Basic Non-Collegiate Board of Reviews for the National Nursing Accrediting Service in New York City.

Job Bias Case is Set For Hearing

NEW YORK — Following protest by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People against a lengthy postponement of the public hearing on charges of violation of the Ives-Quinn law, by the George H. Flinn Corporation, the New York State Commission Against Discrimination today announced that the hearing will be held on October 31.

The hearing, the first public session to be scheduled by the Commission, was originally set for October 4. The company sought postponement until November 14.

Mrs. Marlin Wynn Perry on behalf of the NAACP filed a protest, pointing out that the case was already 7 year old. SCAD granted an extension of time until October 31.

The case involves charges of Walter Pennis that he was discharged by the Flinn Corporation because he protested against the company's discriminatory employment practices.

Pennis further charged that he was threatened with physical violence by Cornelius Cunningham, a company foreman. The company is engaged in the construction of the Brooklyn Battery Tunnel connecting Brooklyn and Manhattan.

Mrs. Perry, who represented the complainant during the preliminary proceedings, will represent him on behalf of the NAACP at the Commission's first public hearing.

BIAS IS DISEASE CLAIMS SPEAKER

BOSTON, Mass. (ANP) — The clearest and most complete analysis of this business of "race prejudice" is contained in the September 21 issue of Zions Herald, weekly organ of the Boston Wesleyan Association. The analysis is done by R. B. Eleazer, retired staff member of the Board of Education in Kaysville, under the heading of "Race Prejudice — Its Nature and Cure."

After defining the word "prejudice" in common usage, as an attitude or opinion based on insufficient evidence, incomplete know-

ledge, incorrect information, false reasoning, fallacious assumptions, outworn tradition, rumor, suspicion, groundless fear, Eleazer had this to say:

"To understand and deal with it effectively we need to take account of three fundamental facts about its nature and cure."

"The first of these is the fact that race prejudice is not inherent; we are not born with it. We acquire it — we catch it from the conditions into which we are born and the people who surround us."

"Secondly, race prejudice is not an air plant, growing out of nothing. It is always rooted in something believed to be real; its roots are unbound to be sure, that is what makes it prejudice, nevertheless, they are always there."

"Finally, prejudice is much more a mistletoe than it is a vice. For the most part, people are prejudiced not because they are mean, but because they are misled."

W. B. HILL SUCCEEDS OTIS IN ALA. AG. POST

TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE (ANP) — The director of Extension Service of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute announced the appointment of W. B. Hill as state leader for extension work with Negroes in Alabama. Hill, who took office Oct. 1, succeeded Dr. J. B. Otis who resigned in September to accept the presidency of Alcorn College in Mississippi.

Hill, a 1931 graduate of Tuskegee, taught agriculture at Arkansas A. M. and N. College in Pine Bluff and Trinity High School, Athens, Ala. Since 1935 he has been in the Extension Service of the State of Alabama.

He received his M. S. degree at Cornell University last spring.

MINISTER HELD FOR MANSLAUGHTER IN FATAL AUTO CRASH

PENSACOLA, Fla. (ANP) — The Rev. J. L. Anderson of Pensacola is being held on a charge of involuntary manslaughter resulting from an accident at Clover, Va. He struck a truck driven by John Smith of Charlotte, N. C., causing the driver to be killed.

The Rev. Anderson was driving the car of the Rev. J. S. Townsend to Pensacola who was a singer, when he hit the front wheel of the truck causing it to crash through a railroad bridge railing on to the tracks of the southern railway below. The truck caught fire.

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
