The Reverends J. W. Barnette and W. D. Burgess, Mrs. Bailey and Mr. Kornegay motored to Belmont Wednesday where they attended the Synod of Catawba, Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. In its three-day session, J. B. Harren traveled by plane Thursday morning to the Synod, being met at Charlotte airport by his pastor, the Rev. M. E. Barnette.

The New Life Movement Committee of Cape Fear Presbytery conducted a workers training group meeting at the Calvary Presbyterian Church, The Rev. O. J. Hawkins, pastor, Wilson, N. C., October 30th. The Rev. B. R. Richardson, Goldsboro; Dr. Gregg, Fayetteville; The Rev. H. T. McFadden, Lenoir; and Elder J. B. Harren and Rev. J. W. Barnette of Rocky Mount were among the group leaders.

On November 6th, the same group will hold classes with another group of New Life Committee at the Haymount Presbyterian Church in Fayetteville. The classes are training lay leaders in personal visitation evangelism, a part of the church's program to recruit workers to present the message of Christ to the unchurched world.

The Rev. J. W. Barnette delivered a sermon from his pulpit at Mt. Pisgah Presbyterian Sunday with a message from Acts, 1:6. "These men who have turned the world upside down, have come also into our city." With the subject, "Ideas Against Things," the minister sought to impress his listeners with the fact that man has placed too much trust in the power of the material things of the world to save him from the impending catastrophe of an atomic eruption which has the world in jitters. The Rev. Mr. Barnette urged a return to the prayer letters of our fathers and a greater trust in God as a solution for our troubled and perplexed minds.

BOY SCOUTS SEEK CLEMENCY FOR WHITE YOUTH
Local Troop 161, Boy Scouts of America, Thomas A. Smith, Scout Master obtained much favorable comment last week when correspondence between the troop and Governor W. Kerr Scott and the office of the Commissioner of Paroles was made public thru the local daily paper. The Scouts thru their leaders, Donald Armstrong, Percy L. Battle, James Pittman, Earl Alston and William Anderson, asked for and urged executive clemency for Jesse Edgar Murphy 14 year-old white youth under a 17 year sentence for attempted rape of a white woman of High Point, N. C. In their petition the scouts said, in part:

"This boy is a boy just like we,

and we feel sorry for him. It doesn't matter with us that he is a member of another group or race of people, and we are members of a minority group. In Scouting we are taught to have no respect for persons. The Scouts asked that the youth be sent to training school instead of to prison. Gov. Scott has promised an investigation of the case.

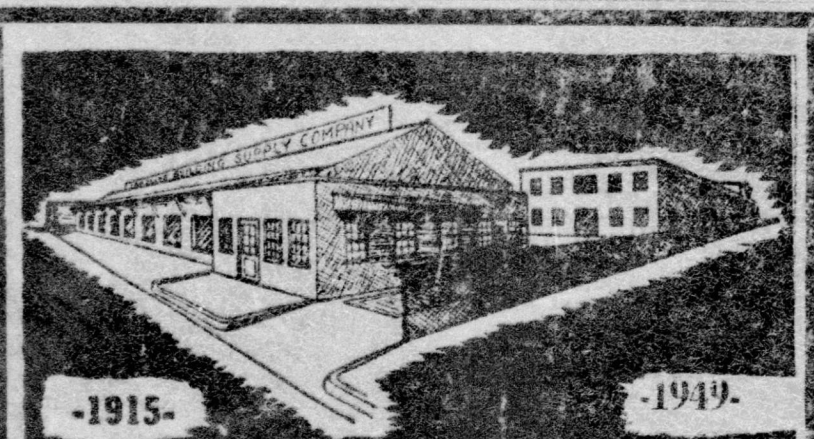
