PALAPYE, Bechuabaland, S. A. (ANP) — Bamangwato tribesmen are convinced that chief-elect Seretse Khama has "good magic medicine." And why? Because his English wife, the former Miss Ruth Williams, is up and about again, after a two weeks' illness.

The 27-year-old chief elect married his 24-year-old white Londen typist last year while he was in England studying in preparation for his role over his 105,000 kinsmen in Bechuanaand.

Soon after Ruth joined her husband, she fell ill of an undiagnosed complaint. Immediately the story flashed that she was bewitched. Last week, the chieftain's wife was once again in good health, and tribesmen are saying it is because her husband, descendant of great chief Khama, has "the greatest magic in the land."

SELECT BENNETT AS CONFERENCE SITE

Greensboro (Special) — The 24th annual session of the North Carolina Negro College Conference will convene at Bennett College on November 9. It was announced here this week by Dr. J. H. Douglass, secretary.

The opening session will begin at 10 o'clock. Speakers scheduled for the morning meeting include Dr. Guy Phillips of Chapel Hill, dean of the University of North Carolina School of Education; Dr. Rose Butler Brown, head of the graduate division of elementary education at North Carolina College, Durham; and Dr. C. E. Sprall, dean of the school of education, Woman's College, Greensboro.

Lunch will be served at 1:30 and the afternoon session will start at 2:15. Dr. Deane Cooke, president of High Point College, will address the afternoon meeting.

Conference officers will be elected after reports are made in the afternoon session. Officers for the ensuing year will be installed at this time.
