NFA MEMBERS AID IN REMODELING OF AG. BUILDING

The Agriculture Department of Spaulding High School started the present school term in a remodeled Agriculture building.

During the Spring of last year's school term the Agriculture shop was remodeled to provide an additional 1000 square feet floor and has been wired with sufficient outlets to accommodate the various pieces of electrical machinery used in constructing shop projects by the different classes.

The entire Agriculture building has been painted inside and out. Part of the paint work was done by NFA members. New blackboards have replaced the old ones and two portable blackboards have been constructed.

An enlarged tool room has been provided and the tool racks properly for more efficient use. Twenty-five dollars worth of new tools were added to the shop during the past months.

The department expects a total paid up NFA membership of approximately forty-five boys who are planning to make this year one of the best in the history of the department.

PLAN EXPANDED MUSIC PROGRAM

The Primary Group of Nash County Teachers under the chairmanship of Mrs. G. S. Lassiter has held three in the first series of professional meetings. The subject for its past meeting was Remedial Reading.

The interest that has been manifested by all members has been of great value to all in the solution of our many problems.

At our second meeting Mrs. L. D. Albright and Mrs. Ruth Ricks gave a demonstration on the "Kinesthetic Technique." It was clearly shown that a retarded person can be helped.

For the closing of this series Miss Dafield gave a very able report on a "Project in Soil Conservation."

The next in the series of Professional Meetings will be held at Spaulding High School. The subject for our discussion will be "Language."

The grammar group has as its chairman — Mrs. Francis Lamb of Central Elementary School. The topic for discussion was on remedial reading.

The High School group has as its chairman — Miss Alice Vaughn. They discussed reading difficulties at the high school and made studies on how these difficulties could be remedied.

They concluded that while there is much the regular class room teacher can do, extra professional aid as may be given by psychologists, speech experts, the remedial reading expert and the sympathetic cooperation of the superintendent and parents is needed.

AFRICAN COEDS RIOT; FIRE TWO BUILDINGS

EAST LONDON, Cape Province (ANP). — Inmate African students, most of them teenage girls, turned an Anglican mission into a shambles late Sunday night, reportedly because of long-standing grievances. Buildings were stoned and a dormitory and an auto were set ablaze in the melee.

Scene of the riot was St. Matthew's College, a combined college and hospital, near Keiskamabhek 60 miles northwest of here.

The students severely beat Miss M. Buckley, girls' house mistress and set fire to her bungalow and car. Hospital matron Mrs. P. Mansell was hit on the head and the house surgeon on the chin with stones. The rioters then moved to the junior girls' hostel and touched off another blaze.

By the time police arrived, the students had assembled on a sports field and were calmly singing hymns. According to the acting warden, the incident began after a concert which everyone seemed to enjoy, although school authorities admitted the Young Africans had long been nursing some grievances.
