Xavier Bows 19-6 To Tuskegee Inst.

Tuskegee Institute Ala. — The Tuskegee Institute Golden Tigers defeated the Xavier University Gold Rush team of New Orleans, 19 to 6, in the Alumni Bowl here today.

The Tigers tallied early in the opening quarter, when George Peterson, captain and left halfback, threw a 40 yard pass to Mike Kuler, Lewis who raced across the goal line for a touchdown. Eugene Porter added the extra point.

Xavier scored shortly afterward when Kippel Roberts, who played brilliantly throughout the game, snatched a pass and outdistanced his pursuers for the touchdown. The try for the extra point was low when the Xavier players again gained possession of the ball they made it appear that the boys from Xavier were in for a drive that the Xavier State would dominate the field and turn scoring opportunities into touchdowns. Laud Plan To Build Recreation Center

Greensboro — (Special) — D. W. Morehead, chairman of the Greensboro Negro Recreation Committee last week endorsed Mayor Ben Cone's proposal to build four recreation centers one for the exclusive use of Negroes.

Mayor Cone's proposal calls for the construction of \$500,000, originally labeled for a sports coliseum in memory of the city's war dead to be spent in the construction of three white recreation centers and one Negro center.

Approval of the mayor's proposal would give the city four completely equipped centers with swimming pools. At this time there is only one municipally operated pool, the Necho Park pool operated for Negroes.

Mayor Cone's plan has the approval also of City Planner, Kenneth Scott who says that several proposed sites are located on city-owned property.

City Recreation Commissioner Chairman John R. Hargis is also in favor of the four centers in lieu of the proposed auditorium which the mayor has termed a "white elephant."

The recreation commission, according to Commissioner Hargis, "would be only too glad if the City Council decided to spend \$500,000 for recreational centers."

Impetus was given the subject, an idea in 1944 when Mr. and Mrs. John K. Voelkner, Jr., contributed \$20,000 for a community playground to serve as a memorial to their son killed in the war.

A community campaign instituted in 1944 also raised funds for a public auditorium to memorialize the city's war dead.

The action of Morehead and the Negro group in approving the center idea was taken at the Windsor Center last Wednesday night.
