OPPORTUNITIES FOR EMPLOYMENT ON INCREASE

DURHAM (Staff Correspondent) — Opportunities for employment in guidance programs in colleges are on the increase, according to a recent survey by Roger D. Russell, director of Guidance at North Carolina College, Durham. Russell, who submitted questionnaires to 56 institutions, to determine the status of their guidance programs, reports in a recent issue of Occupations, a Journal of vocational guidance, that 85.7 percent of the schools have full time programs. The main objective of the survey, Russell states, was to determine possibilities of a trend toward developing and extending guidance practices in the colleges. One of the drawbacks to the program, thus far, has been inadequate training, but this obstacle is being rapidly overcome.
