Mrs. Schwartz, who is new only 24 years old, became interested in raising college enrollment of Negro students while she was an undergraduate at Smith College.

She founded the National Scholarship Service and Fund for Negro students in 1947, to help Nepro students take advantage of more than \$14,000,000 in scholarships available annually at nonregregted American colleges and

The organization has an advisory board of 158 colleges. It operates in ccoperation with 14,000 high schools, with all American nonsegregated celleges, universities, inursing schools teachers' colleges technical institutions, gradaute schools, and with the student race relatens groups on these campuses. Its co-executive vice-chairman is Richard L. Plaut.
