Its equipment is valued at \$29,000. Its stock is of present \$12,000. The store employs eight persons and is seeking to increase its personnel with its facilities used at full capacity. It is estimated that employment could be given to at least twice this number.

Students are preparing for their semester examinations which will be held on the 18th and 19th of January. The semester ends January 25.

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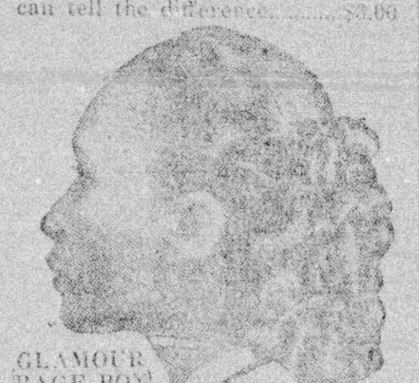
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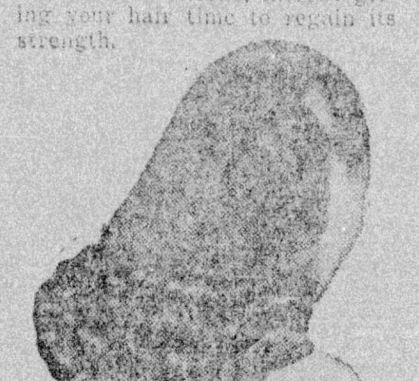
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GOP NAMES MAN
