WINTERS TO SING AT FLORIDA A&M

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Lawrence Winters, baritone of the New York City Opera, will appear here on March 16 in Lee Auditorium in the course of his third concert tour under the direction of Impresario S. Hutok.

The brilliant vocalist made his debut as "Amosasco" in Verdi's "Aida" at the New York City Center Opera in 1948. Said Time Magazine: "By the time the curtain slid down six-foot Harlem Baritone Lawrence Winters had his first big-time opera audience cheering. His voice was full, strong and ringing a note."

Winters has since appeared at the New York City Center as Tonic in "Pagliacci" and in the leading baritone role of William Grant Still's new opera "Troubled Island." This season he assumed for the first time in the City Center's history the four baritone roles in "Tales of Hoffman" and was also heard in "Carmen" and "Porgy and Bess."

Winters came to opera and concert via the Broadway musical hit "Call Me Mister." Impresario S. Hutok, producer of "Red Hot Rhythm" and "The Face on the Drum," immediately signed him to a contract.

Before that Winters starred in the revival of George Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess" as did appear as soloist with Leopold Stokowski and the NBC Orchestra in Beebe's "Night Symphony."

Winters received his musical training at Howard University in Washington, D. C. During school vacations he toured as soloist with the Eva Essie Choir and his booming baritone voice was heard across the country. Since he joined the Bunk Buster, he has been featured in the West Indies and Central America. He will make his European debut next Spring.
