COUPLE CELEBRATE 70TH ANNIVERSARY

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Mr. and Mrs. Henry Harley, ages 65 and 64, respectively, celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary here last week with the same observation that a boy just can't grow up with a big family of young ones around.

The Harleys, who have been married since Feb. 11, 1880, have close to 200 descendants, living, spanning four generations. They had 11 children, four of whom are still living. When they were in their 40's, they took over the family of 13 children of one of their sons, who had died, and raised them. Although they are not certain about the number, they estimate there are about 70 grandchildren, 108 great grandchildren and 19 great-great grandchildren living.

Mr. and Mrs. Harley have known each other all their lives. As Mrs. Harley said, "We're second cousins and grew up together, out near TB in Maryland." He was 24 and she was 19 when they married.

They farmed for many years in Maryland. About 40 years ago they came to Washington, where Harley worked on different construction jobs. Still shy and with perfect eyesight and hearing, both attend mass at St. Stephen's church every other day.

UN GROUP APPROVES PLURAL MARRIAGES

GENEVA, Switzerland — (AP) — With all the hue and cry for the banning of polygamy among African peoples, a four-man UN Trusteeship Council commission decided here last week that the practice of plural marriages is a "type of social security" for African women. According to the commission, which recently returned from a 17-day investigation in the British Cameroons, the practice of having more than one wife is a thing which has been worked out to an exact science.

For example, a male African

may have five wives. The first wife is the boss of the household. One wife may be in charge of the kitchen, two assigned to work in the fields, another in charge of marketing, and so on.

In its report, the group said "Plural marriage is partly a means of assistance to the women involved. Polygamy will have to continue until western civilization through education convinces the Africans that other ways are better and preferable."

Democracy Must Win

CAIRO, E. — (AP) — Declaring that Abraham Lincoln was really a spiritual heir of Thomas Jefferson, the early exponent of Democracy, Rep. Carmel Davis, guest of honor at the Lincoln Day banquet held here Saturday night, remarked that you can't preserve democracy but you can't "hear" it. "Democracy is something you can't have unless you give it away," he told the 300 diners, a third of them white people, most of whom had never attended a dinner with colored people before.

Lincoln preserved democracy by giving it to others, Davis said. Popular in Southern Illinois, an area as backward in race relations as though it were below the Mason-Dixon line, the young member of the Illinois legislature was being honored because of his work in securing equalization of salaries in the separate Negro schools which abound in the lower tier of counties in this state.

During his five terms in the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, Davis said, "I have offered many laws and assisted in the passage of many. I think the Jenkins amendment to the school appropriations last session, which prohibits state schools money from being spent on separate or Jim Crow schools is a fine law."

"The purpose of the law is to provide you with a remedy against existing evils. You have a remedy against the evil of schools which discriminate. It's up to you if you want your children to enjoy first class citizenship. The law doesn't compel you to use it but it is right there for you to use. We have a civil rights law, statute in the State of Illinois. If your rights are violated use it. If you sleep on your rights, you lose them."

After all with these weapons in your hands it's not what people are doing to you in Illinois. The real question is what are you doing about the awful things they do to you. Is there a remedy?

FATHER THREATENS SON; SON KILLS FATHER

ATLANTA — (AP) — Last week a father withdrew the knife which he held at his own throat saying, "I wouldn't kill you because you are my own son."

Then, according to police officials, his 24-year-old son grabbed the knife and killed his father.

George Ezzard, the son, was booked on suspicion of murder. He and his father, Grady Ezzard, were residing in their home here.

KING VOWS TO KEEP ENGLISH BRIDE

LONDON (AP) — Young King Seretse Khama, ruler of 125,000 Basotho in the Bechuanaland Protectorate, held his first meeting with Commonwealth Relations Secretary Philip Noel Baker, and he is believed to have held his original position.

Informed sources stated that Noel Baker pleaded with Khama to give up his throne or his English bride, Ruth Williams, 24-year-old London tycoon. It is reported that during this first session Khama turned down an offer to carry out an advisory council that would replace his throne.

Another argument used by the British government officials is that the presence of a mixed marriage in the South African orbit is not enough, but the existence of a mixed marriage on the Bechuanaland throne is impossible. Noel Baker stressed the fact that neighboring South Africa, Southern Rhodesia, and Southwest Africa are all allied against anything that smacks of racial equality, and they may cause serious trouble.

Khama has the overwhelming support of his tribe, and it is believed that the faction led by A. M. Tseko, Khama's former

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
