In other words, it appears that the infant entertainment industry is giving Negroes an opportunity to present themselves as respectable human beings, not as the "jazzbois" of most other media.

The Negro is as he does on television, and let's hope it continues that way.  
Many Negro entertainers have found it easier to conform to the requirements expected of them than to fight those discriminatory elements, so there are Negro entertainers who still wear lend clothes or foot suits and who submit to being jim crow characters rather than honest Negroes.

It is hard to blame the entertainers for this and I don't doubt that I may have offended myself, unintentionally. But now is the time to fight for self respect. If television is willing to look upon the Negro as an equal, and a human being, we entertainers should bend every effort to representing the members of our race with respect and truthfulness.

In all of my many television appearances I have held that thought uppermost in my mind and I shall continue to do so, for television is more than an entertainment factor. Television affords the viewer, in his home, an education in how the members of society can live without prejudice.

Arthur Godfrey's "Mariners" is a living example of democracy in action, and I mean true democracy. But more important is the fact that millions of people weekly SEE this democracy in action. They learn that this kind of democracy can work if they will allow it to. And they see one of the nation's most beloved stars, Godfrey himself, entering into this democratic bargain.

## U. S. SUPPORTS SWEATT SUIT IN COURT TEST

WASHINGTON (ANP) — The department of justice filed a brief with the U. S. Supreme court last Thursday in behalf of G. W. McLaurin and Herman Marion Sweatt, two Negro students who have been denied the opportunity to obtain higher education in the Oklahoma State College and the Texas State college respectively, without discrimination because of race.

The brief, which was signed by Philip B. Perlman, solicitor general and Philip Elman, special assistant to the attorney general, clearly pointed out that "under the constitution every agency of government, federal and state, must treat our people as Americans, and not as members of particular group divided according to race, color, religion or national ancestry."

The brief described "separate but equal" as an ancient doctrine of constitutional law. It further states that the "subordinate position of Negroes in this country has been described as the greatest unsolved task for American democracy. The racial discrimination typified by these cases represent a challenge to the integrity of our profession of democratic faith."

Quoting from the President's message to the congress on February 2, '48, the brief states that "if we wish to inspire the peoples of the world whose freedom is in jeopardy, if we wish to restore hope to those who have already lost their civil liberties, if we wish to fulfill the promise that is ours, we

must stand for the continuing improvement of the practice of democracy in our own way. We need to do this now."

McLaurin, who is a graduate student at the University of Oklahoma, is pursuing for a doctor's degree in education. Since the time he enrolled, he has been required to sit at a special desk set aside for him in the hallway of the classroom. He was permitted to use the library only if he takes his books to a designated desk on the mezzanine floor. He could not sit in the school cafeteria but only at a different table from the other students.

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## TIE VOTE CHOKES FEPC

WASHINGTON (ANP) — For the second time in three weeks a tie vote has pigeonholed the Powell Fair Employment Practices bill in the House Rules committee. Thursday, the committee voted 6 to 6, thereby refusing to clear the way for an FEPC in the immediate future.

Two Republicans and four Democrats voted to send the bill to the House floor, while four Democrats voted to send the bill to the House floor, while four Democrats and two Republicans voted down the motion.

Seven votes are required to give the bill the greenlight. This means that it probably will be months before the bill will get a chance for a vote in the House. On January 24, the committee split 5 to 5 to block its introduction.

Its next best chance for introduction is on calendar Wednesday when bills can be introduced regardless of committee opposition. But Wednesday, February 22, is Washington's birthday, a speech makers' holiday.

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## Rankin Attacks Lincoln, Jefferson, Jews, Negroes

WASHINGTON (ANP) — The pulpit holding the most prestigious and academic of Abraham Lincoln, which were expressed by the majority of the American people last Monday were attacked by Cong. Wm. Rankin as unbecomingly quotations attempted to describe America.

Speaking on the House floor, the Mississippi representative said that Lincoln, Jefferson and Jackson would be greatly shocked if they could come back today and find what is going on and what representations are being made in their names.

Since Jefferson was a slaveholder, the speaker pointed out, the words that "all men are created equal" would not have been construed in his time to mean that there is no difference between the races.

He stated that the FEPC is a dangerous piece of communistic legislation which certain individuals are attempting to force upon America in the name of Andrew Jackson.

If Abraham Lincoln could hear his name being used in arguments to support this "communistic monstrosity," continued Mr. Rankin, "he would spurn such a proposition with utter contempt."

In his attack upon the Communism, Mr. Rankin said "Communism is Yiddish." He pointed out that "every member of the Politburo around Stalin is either Yiddish or married to one, and that includes Stalin himself."

He condemned "our Yiddish Socialist General" for filing a brief with the Supreme Court in the Henderson case. He charge that this attempt "to wipe out all segregation, and destroy our separate schools throughout the country" is a part of the Communist program laid down by Stalin 30 years ago.

Without mentioning his name, Cong. Rankin brought into his discussion the case of Leslie Perry, a prominent NAACP executive, who recently announce his marriage to Miss Ruth Wayand, an outstanding white Washington attorney.

"This little Yiddish woman lawyer" continued the Mississippian, "has filed a brief in the Supreme Court of the United States in the Henderson case trying to tell the decent white people of America what to do."

After having extended in the Congressional record speeches which he made in opposition to the FEPC in 1945 and 1947, Mr. Rankin concluded, "Mr. Speaker, it is ridiculous for members of this House to use the name of Lincoln, Jackson and Jefferson in their argument for the passage of this infamous FEPC."

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## TENAMENT FIRE KILLS FOUR

YONKERS, N. Y. (ANP) — A fire on the roof of a tenement building and from a tenement on the adjoining block early Saturday morning, four persons lost their lives. Six other were injured, two critically, and 40 were left homeless.

The dead, all of one family, were Mrs. Beola Daley, 28 years old, and her three daughters, Stanley, 5, Beola, 5, and Ruth, 21 months.

Critically injured was Alfred Daley, 40, head of the family, and his son, John, 10. He threw the boy from a window and jumped. Also injured were his other children, Luther, four, and Christine, 11, as well as Mrs. Lucille Faulk, 36, and her son, Alvaro, four. Firemen found Gail Faulk, one-month-old in the building and brought her away unharmed.

## END OF COLOR QUIZ SOUGHT BY LAWYERS

NEW YORK (ANP) — The New York County Lawyers' association voted last week to urge the American Bar association to end its racial quiz on membership application blanks.

William North Seymour, delegate to the bar association's House of Delegates, which meets this week in Chicago, was instructed by the county association to urge the national body to "remove from its application for membership blanks, the requirement that the applicant state whether he is white, Indian, Mongolian or Negro." The resolution was adopted unanimously.

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
