Dr. Bunche Nominated For 1950 Nobel Prize

OSLO, Sweden — Twenty-eight persons, including Dr. Ralph Bunche, famed Negro diplomat, were nominated here early this week for the 1950 Nobel Peace Prize.

Attacking "gradualism" in providing civil rights for Negroes, as "the most dangerous doctrine of our age," he urged his audience to speak out against the limitation of minority rights and to bring pressure on gov't officials at all levels. (Continued on page 8, this section)

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RALEIGH — The Rev. F. Eastler, of the United Church, today man in Raleigh to brave early morning drizzle to greet Rev. Bunche on his recent visit to the city, gained a victory here this week in his fight for better racial understanding.

By a vote of 35-37 the members of his church, dismissed charges brought against him and his inter-racial program, in a letter of protest written by five church members who called themselves "Church Group Committee."

The letter charged that a program of "inter-racial attitudes and practices" was splitting the church, that Rev. Eastler's leadership is inadequate and that the church's Youth Fellowship has become "merely an instrument of inter-racial propaganda."

When the matter was brought a vote, the group of some 200 people voted 35-37 for a resolute declaration that the allegations in the letter "were without basis fact" and supported the church program and Rev. Eastler.

Rev. Eastler was out of town Tuesday. (Continued on page 8, this section)
