## GROUP PROMISES INVESTIGATION OF HOSPITAL

RALEIGH — The cloud of ill will created by the City Council's sudden decision to halt all further financial aid to St. Agnes Hospital, fozzled out in an unspectacular manner on Monday when the Wake County Commission voted to assume some complete responsibility for the care of all indigent Wake County patients at St. Agnes after March 20.

The decision of the County to assume the responsibility was greeted with profuse expressions of thanks by the Council delegation attending the meeting, but notice was served by Father George A. Fisher of St. Augustine's College, that another battle over the hospital will soon be staged.
