NE WYORK CITY - The powerful Actors Union, Actors Equity, in line with its fight against segregation has undertaken the leadership to improve conditions of its Negro members on tour. Because of the importance of this cause, the union has elected a Negro member to its tour committee, which will act as a spokesman for Actors Equity. This was also elected by prominent booking offices on Broadway.

A committee, including representatives of various organizations headed Equity is working for better hotel accommodations for Negro performers. These hotels would be designated "Equity Hotels" and all members of it show on tour, both white and Negro, would be urged to stay at them. Also being worked out are equal train and eating facilities.
