Bunn, chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Wake County and brought from Bunn the virtual demand that another election be held at 7 p.m. today. 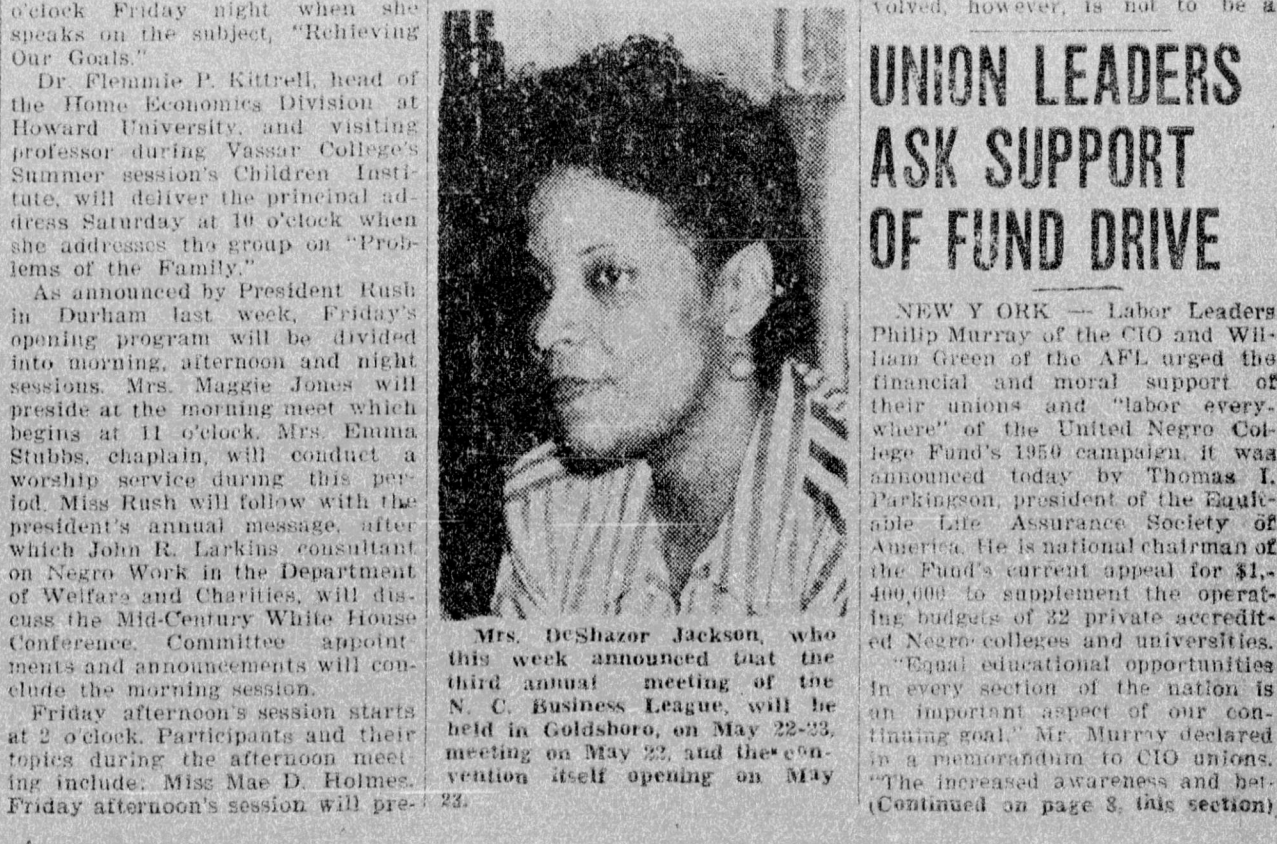
