Birth of the three girls bring the total number of children in the Yellock home here up to four. The Yellocks are also the parents of a boy, aged 15 months. Mrs. Yellock is the wife of James Yellock, a 22-year-old local resident. They have been married about three years.

According to reports, the babies are enjoying the best of health.

## Youth's Gun Try Abortive

DURHAM, N. C. — Considered low grades and other words which he confined only to himself, Jack Mitchell, an 18-year-old Hargett High School senior, attempted to take his life early this week.

Mitchell, who is now in Lincoln Hospital undergoing treatment for critical self-inflicted gunshot wounds, narrowly missed killing himself with the pistol with which he shot himself through the fleshy part of the shoulder. Described as gloomy and introverted, young Mitchell was said to have been in fear of failing in his final year at the local high school.

## Williston Students Protest

Hester, Hanover County Public Schools was called out to Williston High School on Wednesday as a new outbreak based on the riotous protests of students in the case involving a student and an instructor, arose. ## Was Your Nose Counted?

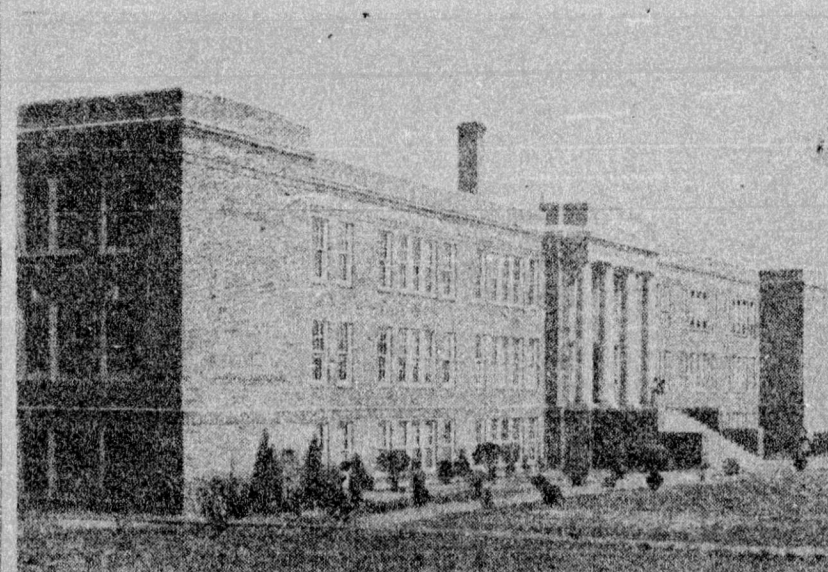

## Mob Violence Fear Averted Near Rocky Mount As Posse Hunts Man

ROCKY MOUNT, N. C. — Fear of mob violence was quickly averted here this week when it was pointed out that the 50 or more men staging an intensified manhunt for a Negro accused of attacking a young white woman, was operating within the sphere of the law.

The woman, listed by Nash County Sheriff as Mrs. Marvin Lee Murphy, 18, caused the huge manhunting posse to gather when the hysterically told the county official that "a big Negro man" came out of the woods and grabbed her as she was working in a plant bed some 200 yards from her home.

The woman said that she was thrown to the ground and hit her about the head and face. She said that she screamed and broke away from the man and then ran to her house.

The alleged attacker, she said, apparently frightened, fled into the woods. She bare scratches about the head and face.

The woman, listed by Nash County Sheriff as Mrs. Marvin Lee Murphy, 18, caused the huge manhunting posse to gather when the hysterically told the county official that "a big Negro man" came out of the woods and grabbed her as she was working in a plant bed some 200 yards from her home.

Several attempts to summon a doctor were in vain and the baby was rushed by ambulance to the hospital. The death was listed as accidental.
