RALEIGH -The rains came to Central and Eastern North Caroina last week, bringing with them high winds and hail and leaving a their wake hundreds of acres totally ruined crops

The rains, the hall and the wind played no favorites, smashing through the properties of all persons, white and colored, owner and tenant, leveling stands of tobacco and inuniating truck crops beneath tons

Negro farmers in an area reach ing from Wake County going Eastward to and through Wilson and Nash counties, stand in dire need of assistance, and presented pitable spectacle to CAROLINIAN reporters who interviewed them on the sites of their ruined season's

A typical situation occurred on the farm owned by Avon Privett, an automobile dealer in Zebulon whose to tenant farmers saw their crops smashed to bits by driving hail and roaring winds last Thursday morning

Two Negro tenant farmer on the Privett estate, Ernest Carpenter and Elijah Moore have no way in which to figure their actual losses during the storm. While tobacco crops are insured for only \$200 an acre, with the tenant-owner percentage being 50-50 the men also sustained lasses from their farm crops with the possible exception of corn which miraculously bore the brunt of the storm with seemingly unswerving resist-

N. C. NUMBERS DRIVE GROWS: 12 MEN NABBED

GREENSBORO -The state-wide concentrated crackdown on the infamous "Numbers" racket gained more impetus here last week when a total of 12 men were arrested for taking part in the lottery.

The two arrests made Friday brought the week's "take" in the crackdown up to the dozen figure. At least nine of the persons arrested during the past week had previous convictions on lottery charges, convictions hanging from playing to writing and collecting

The Numbers setup in Greensbere is predominately "atter and eggs" in which published stock market figures are used to determine the winning number for the day. In other cities in the state, the numbers lotteries are operated on the "T-T" plan in which the published records of utility changes are utilized

In Eastern North Carolina, the usual mode for numbers operation is through the use of a "wheel" The bet slips are placed in a bin usually located in a hide-away At a certain time of the day, the bin is shaken up and spun, with the number on the first slip to fall from the bin being considered the



RALEIGH - If legislation discussed in Raleigh Wednesday by the Domestic Relations Commission becomes a reality, even state lines may soon be no protection to me who desert their families.

Among other matters, the Commission studied a proposed bill to recommend to the 1951 Legislature which would make North Carolinas' laws pertaining to abandonment effective in other states as well, pending enactment of reciprocal legislation in those states. About a dozen states already have such

legislaton. The Commission met in the Justice Building, with all members present, and considered possibilities of amendments and additions to several other North Carolina statutes pertaining to children in divorce cases, guardjanship, juvenile court age jurisdiction, and abandonment and

non-support.
