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TEACHER JAILED ON BUS JIMCRO CHARGE

Mrs. G. E. Cheek To Stand Trial

ASHEVILLE — In one of the first cases of its type since the recent U. S. Supreme Court ruling relative to transportation segregation on trains, Mrs. Emma Bond Cheek, prominent teacher-principal of Raleigh is scheduled to face trial in City Court here July 19 on charges of violating North Carolina's bus segregation law.

Mrs. Cheek, wife of Rev. G. E. Cheek, public relations director of Shaw University, Raleigh was removed from a bus here last week, and jailed on the charge, after a driver sought to make her move from the third seat from rear of the vehicle, charged that she was willful disrespect of the law.

Mrs. Cheek was traveling from Raleigh to Knoxville, Tenn., on an interstate trip, when the incident occurred. She was taken to the local courthouse and jailed for failure to post a \$100 bond as security for appearance in court the next morning.

Rev. Mr. Cheek was contacted in Raleigh via telephone and in turn, made contact with the Rev. King Otis Dunn and others of the Ministerial Alliance of Asheville, who secured Mrs. Cheek's release from the jail.

Mrs. Cheek has been a teacher in the public schools of North Carolina for more than a quarter of a century. She is now principal of the Jeffries School of Wake County, president of the Washington High School PTA for the last four years; historian for the State Congress of Colored Parents and Teachers; Sunday School Teacher at the First Baptist Church, and General Group Leader for the entire church.

Mrs. Cheek is the mother of four children and the grandmother of four grandchildren.

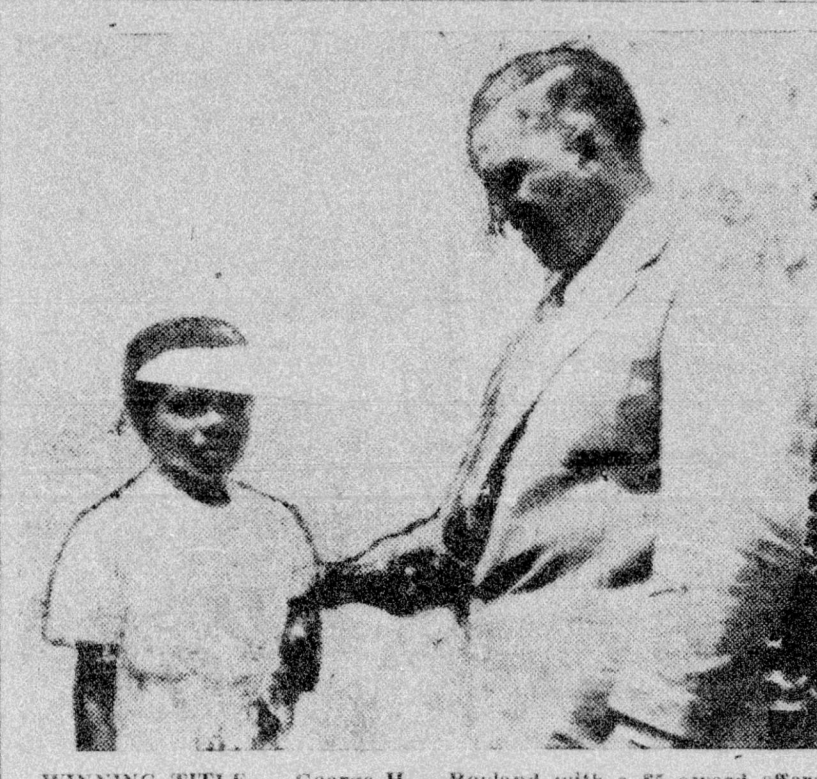

NC COUNTIES EARMARK FUNDS TO EQUALIZE

Throughout the State, efforts are being made to bring about a semblance of equality between public schools attended by white students and those attended by Negro students.

Even before hearing was actually started in the Durham schools equity case now being presented before a Federal District Court, many North Carolina counties announced articles of the gross inequities of their schools and set about remedying them.

In Brunswick County this week, building on a new Union school for Negro students was halted when factions differed on location of the new facility. Funds have set aside and bids accepted for the building of a school to serve Shelton, Waccamaw and a part of Lockwood Fully Townships.

Opposing factions, however, failed to see eye to eye on the location of the school, with the Shalotte faction asking that the edifice be placed near decision scheduled to be forthcoming.
