

Va. Bus Company Denies Jim Crow Charges

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Describing a plaintiff as an "intentional troublemaker," the Carolina Coach Company of Virginia denied charges of discrimination before the State Corporation Commission here last week. The "troublemaker" reference applied to a Negro college student who made charges of discrimination in a suit filed against the company.

"Petitioner, in reality, complain of a violation of law but of the bus driver's compliance with it," said.

Raney asked the State Corporation Commission on May 10 to enjoin the bus company from discriminating again him because of his race in transporting him from Suffolk to his home in Davis, Virginia State College.

Martin A. Martin, Richmond's attorney, filed Raney's petition which alleges that Raney boarded the bus and took the vacant seat that bus driver "he says told him was 'as necessary or proper' in recent years. Virginia officials have emphasized the police power prerogatives which bus drivers and conductors have under Virginia law to fight U. S. Supreme Court decision outlawing segregation on interstate carriers.

This law giving bus drivers police powers the statement says stipulates that "no contiguous seat on the same tenen shall be occupied by white and colored passengers at the same time."

The statement which is also answered to the racial discrimination suit filed with the State Corporation Commission says further:

"Petitioner, in reality, complains of a violation of law but of the bus driver's compliance with it."

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
