Va. Bus Company Denies Jim Crow Charges

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Describing a plaintiff as an intentional troublemaker, the Carolina Coach Company of Virginia denied charges of discrimination before the State Corporation Commission here last week. The "troublemaker" reference applied to a Negro college student who made charges of discrimination in a suit filed against the company.

According to the company's statement to the commission, Everett Roney, a Suffolk resident, insisted on occupying a seat next to a white woman on the company's Suffolk to Norfolk bus which was a violation of Virginia law.

The bus driver is alleged to have asked Roney to move, but he refused the company's statement.

The statement cited Virginia law to prove that a bus driver has special powers in this state and can require any passenger to change his seat "if it may be necessary or proper." In recent years Virginia officials have emphasized the police power prerogative which bus drivers and conductors have under Virginia law to fight U. S. Supreme

Court decision outlawing segregation on interstate carriers.

This law giving bus drivers special powers, the statement says stipulates that "no contiguous seat on the same bench shall be occupied by white and colored passengers at the same time."

The statement which is also answer to the racial discrimination suit filed with the State Corporation commission, says further:

"Petitioner, in reality, complains of a violation of law but of his driver's compliance with the law."

Roney asked the State Corporation commission to allow him to join the bus company from discrimination against him because his race in transporting him from Suffolk to the Norfolk Division, Virginia State College.

Martin A. Martin, Richmond attorney, filed Roney's petition with the commission.

He alleged that Roney boarded the bus and took the "first vacant" seat.

The driver, he says, told him to move "so that persons of the white race could sit," Roney refused.

The driver then ordered all passengers off the bus, drove around the block and reloaded, but refused to let Roney get back on the bus.
