### YOUNG MOTHER LEFT CHILDREN FOR PARTY LIFE

Children Too Weak To Move When Found By Grandfather

HAMLET — A 22-year-old mother is facing charges here of leaving her three minor children starving and dirty, while she goes on "wild parties" which sometimes last as long as two days at a time.

Facing charges of neglecting her children aged 6, three and two is Mrs. Irene Johnson, whose father-in-law has preferred the charges.

### GOVERNOR IS KEYNOTER AT LABOR MEET

Chief Executive In Blast Against All Intolerant Acts

WINSTON-SALEM — North Carolina Gov. Kerr Scott, drew back here this week and again lashed out at the forces of intolerance against as he declared that "no nation can ever rise to its full height when it works against the rights of individuals."

Further taking his political fire to his hands, the Governor speaking before the 24th North Carolina interracial meeting with white attendants on one side and Negro on the other, declared prejudice whether it be racial, religious, or of any other description.

As principal speaker before the 43rd annual convention of the North Carolina State Federation of Labor, the Governor told the 2 delegates gathered at the Zinze don Hotel Ballroom that prejudices which caused the defeat of interim Senator Frank P. Graham in the recent U. S. Senatorial Primary had "set North Carolina back 25 years."

The Governor told the delegates who would be prone to spread intolerance, prejudice, that they should remember before the Negro did come into this country of his own accord. The white man brought him here.

## Lad, 5, Is Polio Victim

RALEIGH — A five-year-old Raleigh lad became the 29th reported case of infantile paralysis in the Wake County area last week when a delayed report on the true condition of the tot was made public.

Found to be suffering from the dread disease as of August 5, was Paul Leslie Currie of 116 Carver Street here who was transferred from the local Saint Agnes Hospital to the Greensboro Convalescent Hospital for treatment.

According to reports, the small polio victim was taken to the St. Agnes Hospital on August 5. The existence of the 29th polio case in Wake County was not reported, however, until August 11th.

**Youthful Assault Victim Is Deprived Of Interview**
