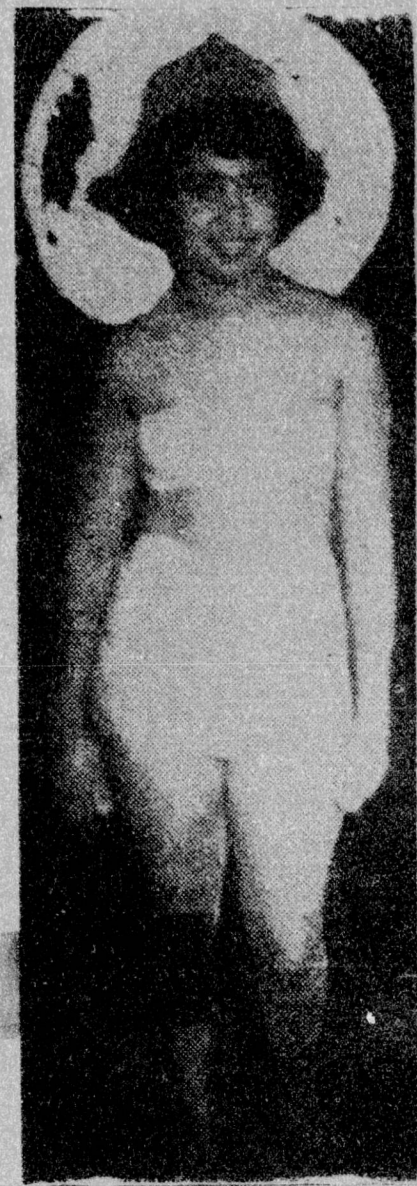


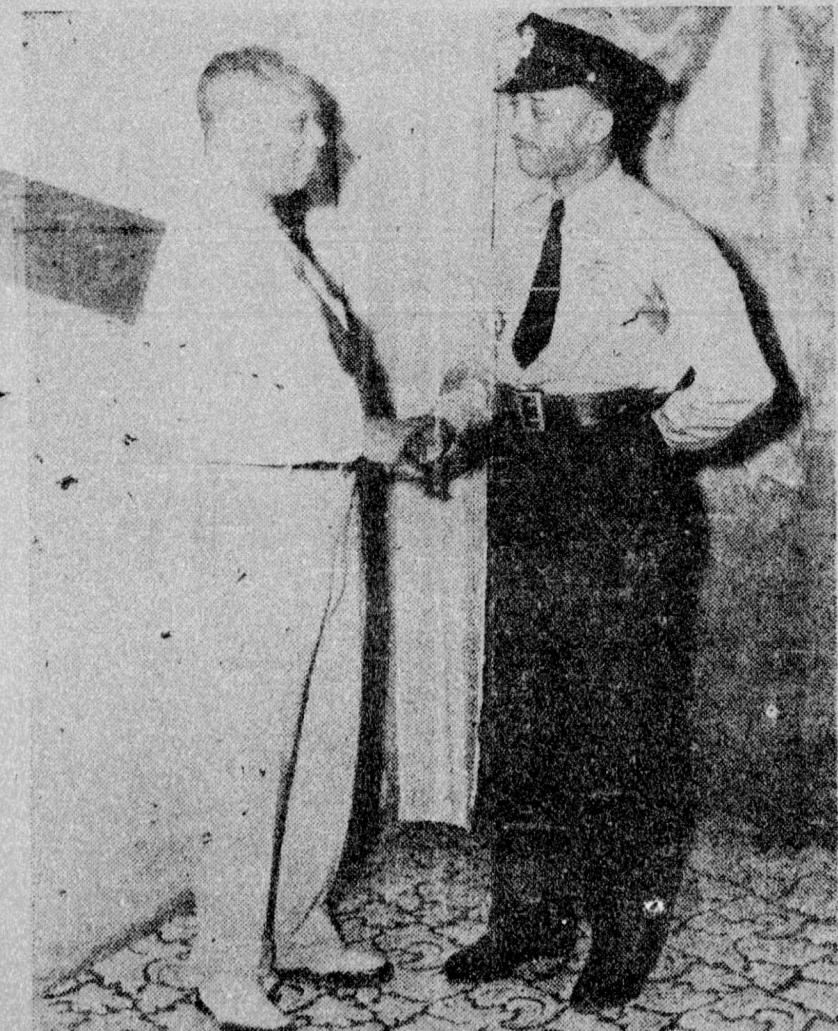
'ALL-OUT' SCHOOL SUIT MAPPED
