94 Year Old Raleigh Lady Tells Historic Story Of City

RALEIGH — History was repeated at 11:05 a. m. Tuesday, September 12, when Mrs. Sarah Pershal Jones McCoy of 514 East North Street thought of no better way to celebrate her 94th birthday than to give an account of events in Raleigh as she remembered in her childhood days.

Mrs. McCoy was born in Raleigh near the site where General Cox and the troops were quartered and is the daughter of Mrs. Sallie Jones, who at that time was employed as a cook with a Whitaker family.

She attended Green Hill School, and a school in Panther Branch township. Before moving to the country, she attended school at Rush Memorial Church, then from Gioness hotel and Johnson High School to Saint Paul, which was called Rock Church on East Cameron street. Gioness hotel was on the north side of the Capitol, and the principal was a Mrs. Leland. Other teachers remembered were Misses Bates and Hancock.

Mrs. McCoy was living on Cabarrus street when she attended Nevils church. She then moved to the rear of the St. Paul area.

She recalls when men were transporting rock from the quarry to build the Capitol. The cutters were boarding with the Whitakers. When 12 years old, she took her younger brother Eddie down to the Capitol walked around it, observing its beauty and architectural work. She also took him to the depot almost everyday. At that time, it was the Raleigh-Gaston Railroad station. Another station, the old depot, was located on Johnson street. The engineer would sometimes ride through from one part of town to the other, "Speaking" on military affairs, and conditions enveloping Raleigh at that time, the aged lady remembers when her grandmother, who was a cook for a family on Hargett street unknowingly saw Abraham Lincoln walk down the street with a Mr. Pescud, who owned a drug store. Altho he never inquired about Lincoln's name, Lincoln asked for his name in a conversation ensued. Lincoln's identity being unknown incited him to ask Pescud's opinion of Abraham Lincoln. Pescud replied, "I don't know, nothin' SH I'd many statements in a satirical way. He realized he had talked too much when he received a letter from Washington, D. C. from Lincoln, revealing his identity. What an embarrassing moment for Pescud.

When her grandmother saw Lincoln and Pescud going to the cemetery on Hargett street she summoned the lady by whom she was employed to find out with whom Pescud was walking. She replied, "He looks like Dr. Skinner."

She stated that Lincoln stopped at Yarbo Hotel, but did not register or eat because he was a union man. So Pescud and Lincoln went to Mr. Bourgeois' at Law University, then to Eckard's Drug Store. Upon arrival at Eckard's, one of the Confederates fired on one of the generals who had come in. They set the depot afire. In it was ammunition and corn. They knew that the Yankees were nearby, and did not want them using it. She added that a crier on a white horse notified the Confederates that the Yankees were in Raleigh, which created

Two men were on duty at each house with a bucket of water to prevent fire from spreading if it started. She was between 8 and 9 years old when this happened.

Regarding some of the edifices which now stand, Mrs. McCoy remembers when the Catholic church used to be at the location of the First Baptist Church on Wilmington street. Of course, the churches around capital square were still there, and several other buildings still stand.
