Ditching With Dynamite Saves Farmer Many \$\$\$'s

Opening a drainage ditch by dynamite instead of by hand resulted in an estimated saving of \$175 for a Madison County farmer, Homer Ferguson of the Athens community.

By dynamiting the ditch, Ferguson was able to drain an objectionable swamp, remove the source of foot rot infection in his cattle, and salvage unused land for pasture.

For some time Ferguson had been treating foot rot in his cattle. But each time he succeeded in clearing it up, the disease began re-asserting. When he called on V. L. Holloway, county agent for the State College Extension Service, for advice on how to control the disease, Holloway traced the infection to the swamp on Ferguson's pasture. As fast as the infection came under control, the cattle would pick up more from the swamp.

Ferguson decided to drain the swamp and arranged with County Agent Holloway for a ditch blasting demonstration. To drain the ditch properly it was found that a ditch around 200 feet long and 3 to 4 feet deep would be required.

Two cases of special ditches, dynamite were used, along with a cap to get off the charge. Dynamite sticks were set 15 inches apart and 12 inches deep along the site of the proposed ditch. Then the electric cap was placed in the last stick and a double wire extended to a safe distance. As the charge went off, 85 cubic yards of mud, sumps, water, and gravel flew 300 feet into the air.

When the smoke cleared away, spectators saw a perfect drainage ditch 202 feet long, 3 to 4 feet deep, and 3 feet wide at the top. The entire operation cost about one-eighth of what it would had it been done by hand, and required the services of only four persons for two hours.

NCC Eagles Win 13 To 0

DOVER, Del. — The North Carolina College Eagle punched out two fourth quarter touchdowns to earn a hard-earned 13-0 victory over a fiercely fighting band of Delaware State College gridgers here last Saturday.

The victory was the third on the season for Coach Herman H. Bidwell's Eagles. The Hornets have suffered two consecutive set backs.

The stubbornly resisting Delaware eleven put up a stiff battle in the scores first half as they held the Eagles for four downs within the two yard line in the first quarter and penetrated to the North Carolina College 25 on an aerial drive sparked by the accurate tossing of Herb Ramsey and George Brown.

Finally asserting their superiority, the Eagles marched 60 yards for their first tally and struck through the air from 25 yards out for the game-winning TD in the final period.

NCC's triple threat halfback and captain, Butler "Bluejuice" Taylor, a Newport News, Va., product, climaxed the 60 yard postward march with a two yard plunge into the end zone, resulting in the fourth quarter and forced to end Earnest Warlick, 220 pounder from Hickory, N. C., for the other NCC tally in the waning minutes of the tilt.

The Eagles unleashed a bit of razzle-dazzle as their first touchdown drive was sparked by a double lateral which was halfback Arthur McGuire, Raleigh, N. C. Junior, takes a backward pass from sophomore quarter back Joe Battle, Rocky Mount, N. C., and scoot from the enemy 41 to the 28 where he lateraled to Warlick, who was pulled down on the 24. A couple of five yard jumps by Cletis Horton, Charlotte, N. C. sophomore, sandwiched in between quarter-back snafus by Battle and a five yard drive penalty against the Hornets put the oval on the seven. Britt bulled to the two, and Taylor scored on the next play. Linwood Johnson's foot for the extra point went wide.

A recovery of George Brown's fumble of McClellan Matthew's punt on the Delaware 16 by Joe Battle in the final minutes of the play set up the game-winning score. The Eagles were thrown back to the 25 in two plays by hot fast charging Delaware forward wall, but scored on the next play as Taylor uncorked his pass which hit Warlick squarely on the button as he stood alone in the Delaware end zone.

James Robinson, Charlotte, N. C. sophomore, tossed to McGuire for the point-after-touchdown.

Two pass interceptions, one by NCC guard Francis McGhee of Alexandria, Va., and another by Ed Darden of Newport News, Va., broke up last ditch aerial drives by the Delawareans.
