Big Attendance Is Prospected For Annual Sessions

PALEIGH — Approximately 1,000 messengers and friends, representing 1600 Baptist Churches with a membership of 280,000, will assemble in Wilmington, N. C., October 31-November 2, to participate in the 83rd annual session of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. Inc. Sessions will be held in the Shiloh Baptist Church, Dr. J. H. Moore, pastor, and the Williston High School.

Major concern will be given during the three days to the task of world redemption. The theme of the meeting is "World Redemption Through Atoning Christianity."

Dr. Randy Ray, pastor of the Cornerstone Baptist Church, Brooklyn, N. Y., will give the feature address centered around the session's theme. The Rev. Mr. Ray who is also executive secretary of the Social Service Commission of the National Baptist Convention, Inc., will speak Wednesday evening November 1 at 8.

Other special addresses will be given by—Dean William R. Strassner of the Shaw University School of Religion, Dr. C. C. Spaulding, president of North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company, Durham; Dr. W. C. Somerville, executive secretary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention; the Rev. G. W. Thomas of Roxboro who will give the keynote address; T. A. Hamme, superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage, and Dr. M. A. Huggins executive secretary of the Baptist State Convention.

Scheduled to preach sermons during the gathering are: Dr. E. T. Brown, pastor of the Mount Vernon Baptist Church, Durham, the Rev. J. E. Melton, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, High Point, the Rev. J. E. Bowden of La Grange.

Panel discussion—"Can the Influence of the Church Establish the True Basis for World Peace?" will be featured Wednesday afternoon, November 1 at 4:15. The Rev. G. E. Check public relations director of Shaw University, will serve as chairman of the panel. Other participants will be the Rev. J. B. Humphrey, Charlotte; the Rev. H. L. Mitchell, Gatesville, and the Rev. Thomas J. Loyd, Raleigh.

Music features will include special selections by the Shaw University Choir and Chorus of the local churches. Harry G. Smythe, director of music at Shaw will direct the University Choral group. Officers of the Convention are: Dr. P. A. Bishop, Rich Square, president; Dr. W. H. Davidson, Charlotte, first vice president; the Rev. D. C. Gore, Whiteville, second vice president; the Rev. J. A. 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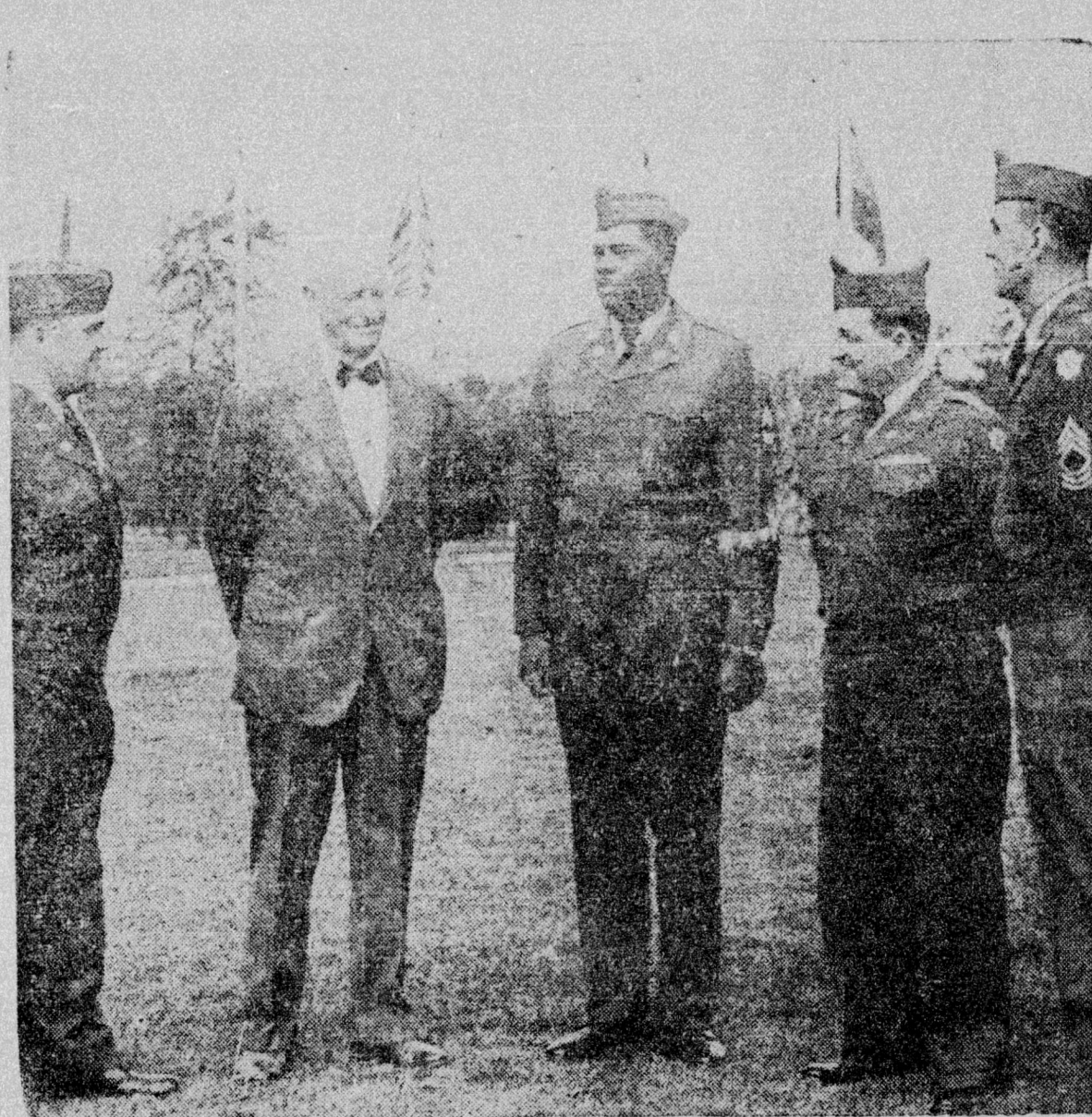

'VOICES' TELL INMATE TO SLAY OLD ATTENDANT

48-Year-Old Man Uses Iron Stake To Beat Other, 51, To Death

GOLDSBORO — A 51-year-old attendant at the State Hospital to death by an inmate here Tuesday morning as the inmate suddenly went berserk and obeyed "voices" he'd heard.

Dead is Robert Clark, who died shortly after having been beaten around the head by John H. Thompson, 48, as the two returned from carrying out garbage.

According to hospital officials, Thompson, until then walking along peacefully with the elder man, abruptly pulled a three-foot long iron stake from the ground and began to bludgeon the attendant, striking him seven times about the head. When aid arrived, the older man was already beyond help.

Dr. Ira C. Long, superintendent of the hospital revealed that Thompson, who was described as a dementia praecox case, afterward told him that "voices" had prompted him to commit the deed.

Thompson, who came here from the hospital in Duplin County some two weeks ago had been temporarily classified and was to have undergone further study this week. Immediately following the killing, he was placed in a ward for the criminally insane.

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MAN WHO TOLD WIFE TO KILL HUBBY NABBED

SMITHFIELD — A white man, who allegedly did "counsel, procure and command" a Negro woman to slay her husband has been arrested here as result of intensive State Bureau of Investigation inquiry into the death of a 36-year-old Selma man.

Mrs. Gladys Richardson, who had been scheduled to be tried this week for the murder of her husband, James, 36, has been fingered as the woman who urged her husband to slay his fish market operator, compelled to do the deed.

Warrels was arrested this week on a warrant sworn out by Selma Police Chief Percy L. Moore. The warrant charges Warrels with being an accessory before the fact of murder.

Mrs. Richardson was charged with killing her spouse on October 17.

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AT ST. AUGUSTINE'S

Mystery Shrouds Prof's Alleged Suicide Attempt

RALEIGH — A shroud of mystery still surrounds the real story involving an alleged suicide try of a young St. Augustine's College instructor last week despite valiant attempts on the part of working press personnel throughout the district to ferret out the facts.

It was learned that Vernon White, about 25, instructor at the local college was admitted to St. Agnes Hospital early last week suffering wounds made by some sharp instrument and allegedly inflicted by himself in a futile suicide attempt.

White, who is said to have completed two years' work toward his Ph. D. degree at Harvard University and who is a graduate of Morehouse College and Atlanta University, reportedly was driven to his suicide attempt by a despondency which has plagued him since his arrival here early this fall to accept a teaching position at St. Augustine's.

HOSPITAL NON-COMMITAL

Inquiries made of officials at

St. Agnes Hospital and St. Augustine's College here, have failed to reveal reasons for Mr. White's alleged despondency or for his suicide attempt.

WINSTON-SALEM — The 28-year-old mother of a five-day-old baby was killed instantly here Tuesday night when she leaped from an upper-story window in a local hospital in a second attempt to destroy herself.

Death of Mrs. Pauline Wingo

was listed as a "clear suicide" by officers investigating her leap from a fourth floor window at Kate Bittings Reynolds Hospital. Mrs. Wingo, described as suffering from "post-delivery psychosis" reportedly had attempted to

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Sad Was The Day Leaf Went Away

DUNN — "Sad, sad, O, Sad" was the Day. They took the tobacco and went away.

That dirge is being mutually chanted here by Ed Oakes, a Neely share crop farmer, and Allen Thornton, with whom Oakes works on shares, following discovery of loss of some 2500 to 3000 pounds of tobacco from a storeroom adjoining Oakes' farm. It was only last Saturday when Oakes, who in addition to sharing, owns 23 acres of the land from which the leaf came, finished grading the crops.

Following that process, the farmer then placed his year's yield in a house adjoining his own and went to sleep, possibly dreaming of the greenbacks the Golden Leaf fetch on some ware house floor.

But, alas, that was not to be the case, for during Saturday night, a thief entered the house and made away with all of the crops except some few scattered nondescript leaves.

When Oakes stored the leaf during the weekend on his New Grove highway farm, he fastened the door with a heavy padlock and snut the windows so
