Drawing the term was Burke O'Brien, who is charged with assault upon the person of Miss Elizabeth Smith with intent to rape. Miss Smith told Judge Leo Carr and the jury hearing the case that the farmer had come to her home in a drunken condition on the night of the assault and broke into the house despite her protests and attempted to assault her. ## NCC 11 GETS BID TO BOWL

### FLORIDA BOWL BID VIEWED WITH UNCERTAINTY

Eagles Concentrate On A. & T. Clash While Fla. Awaits Reply

**DURHAM** — The North Carolina College Eagles football team has received a bid to oppose Florida A. & M. College in the Orange Blossom Classic game to be played at Miami, Fla. on December 2. Whether the North Carolina team will accept the bid could not be learned this week as the team prepares for its championship-determining clash against A. & T. College on Thanksgiving Day. The Orange Blossom Classic game, one of the nation's oldest and foremost Negro intercollegiate "Bowl" attractions, is now being played annually in the Orange Bowl Stadium in cross-town Miami. The North Carolina team was accorded the bid to participate in the annual classic by virtue of its current season's record. The squad is now boasting a record of seven wins, and one loss, with a clear record in Colored Intercollegiate Athletic Association competition. ### Race Patients, Indigents Barred From Sanitarium

**ROCKY MOUNT** — Formal public announcement was made here recently by the staff of the Rocky Mount Sanitarium, one of the city's two principal hospitals which treat Negro patients, that after November 15 the institution would no longer admit Negroes and indigent patients. The Sanitarium explained at length how that, over a 37-year period — since 1914 — it sought to treat all patients — those able to pay and those unable to pay. Losses accrued from the latter group being in part made up by County Welfare contributions and the remainder absorbed by the L. W. Kornegay family, owners of the hospital. It is contended that the deficit which is steadily increasing can no longer be absorbed. The move came not as a surprise to the white and colored leaders here since much council has been taken on the matter through the Community Council (interracial) and other groups for a year or more. Likewise, several abortive attempts over a period of many years have been made toward an all-colored hospital, all with negative results.
