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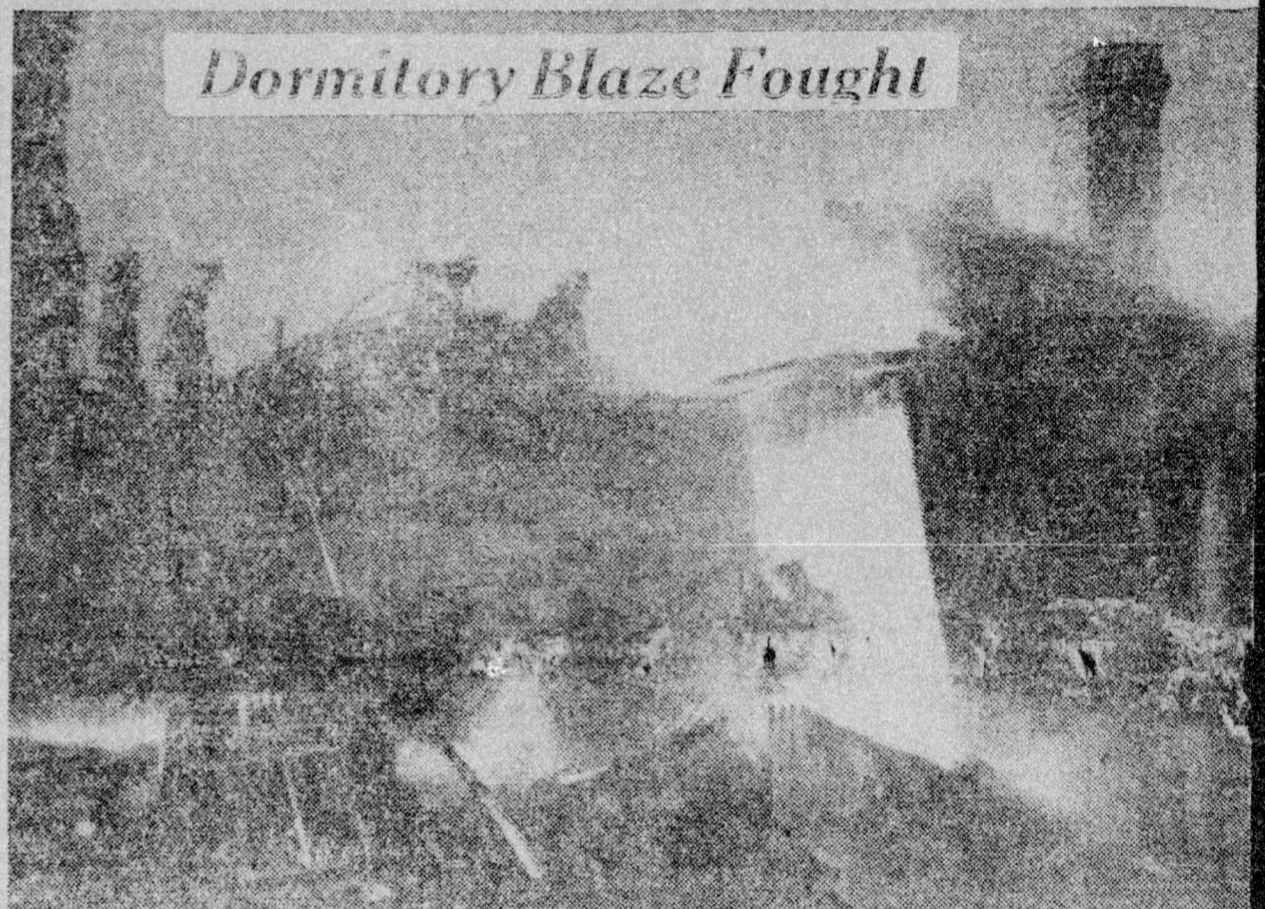
UNDERTAKER IS WINNER AS FEUD REACHES COURT

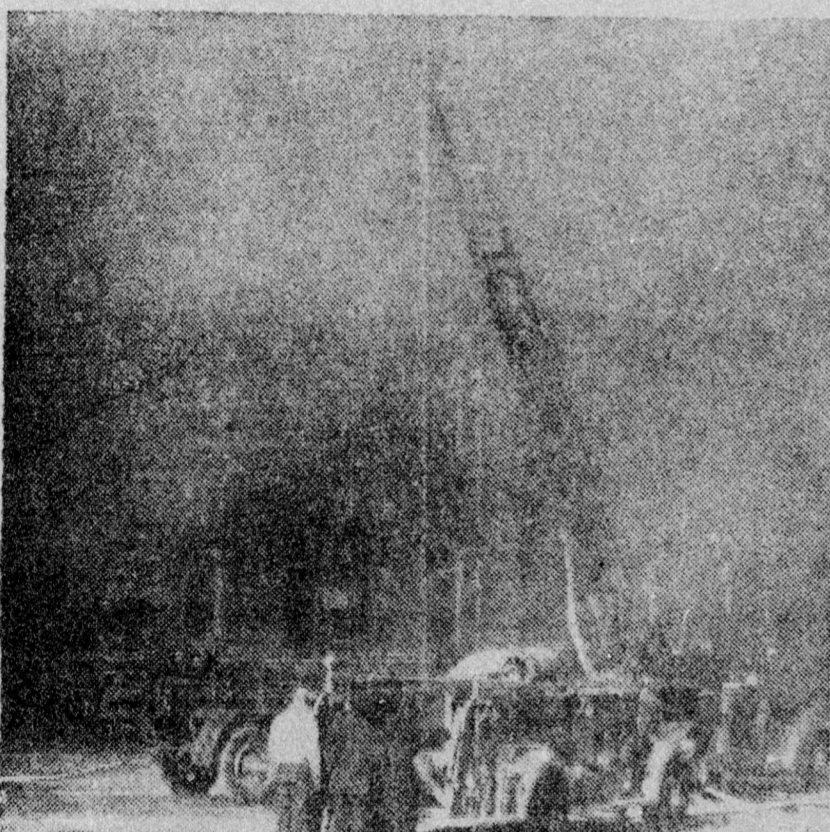
The case was heard Monday morning before Recorder H. Whitfield Smith as a large crowd of interested spectators filled the courtroom.
