## Rabies Scare Spreads

RALEIGH — Two North Carolina towns, Laurinburg and Lumberton have reported an outbreak of rabies within their sectors.

In Laurinburg during the past week, at least eight dogs infected with rabies have been discovered. During the same period, it was reported that Pasteur treatments had been ordered for 50 persons in and around Lumberton believed to have been bitten by infected animals.

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## Fiery Deaths Probed

ROCKY MOUNT — Police officers of two adjacent counties this week continued to probe the mysterious fiery deaths of two Negro residents of the respective counties.

The bodies of two men, one in Edgecombe county and another in Nash, were found at approximately the same hour on Sunday with all clothing except shoes buried from the remains.
